Qatar condemns brutal Israeli aggression

¬he State of Qatar condemned in the strongest terms the brutal Israeli aggression against the Gaza Strip, considering it a new episode in the series of horrific occupation crimes against the defenseless Palestinian people, especially women, and children.

In a statement yesterday, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs warned of the fading chances of peace and the widening of the cycle of violence due to the provocative Israeli escalation in the occupied Palestinian territories. The minister underscored the need for the international community to move urgently to provide the necessary protection for the Palestinian people and to compel Israel to stop its flagrant violations of international law and force it to respect international legitimacy resolutions.

The ministry reiterated Qatar's firm position on the justice of the Palestinian cause and the legitimate rights of the brotherly Palestinian people, including the establishment of their independent state on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital.


The measures implemented by the Ministry of Labour (MoL) contributed greatly to curbing the number of injuries resulting from occupational heat stress in recent years in Qatar.

"This is part of the efforts of the Ministry to promote sustainability and optimal use of resources with its future projects following Qatar National Vision 2030," said Minister of Municipality H E Abdullah bin Abdulaziz bin Turki Al Subaie.

The Minister was speaking at the opening ceremony of the 3rd Recycling Towards Sustainability Conference and Exhibition 2023 which began yesterday in the Sheraton Doha

The two-day event is being organised by the Ministry of Municipality under the slogan "Together We Make the Difference for a Sustainable Future" for exchanging expertise and experiences about the latest methods and technologies in the field of waste recycling and treatment.

Over 35 waste recycling and management experts will be speaking in several sessions at the conference. An associated exhibition is hosting 40 pavilions showcasing the latest technologies, products, and services in the field of waste management and recycling.

The Minister said that the Ministry of Municipality has developed many plans, laws, and integrated goals for the safe disposal of waste of all kinds in all locations utilizing the latest methods.

The Domestic and Solid Waste Treatment Center in Mesaieed produced over 271 million kilowatts per hour of electricity and 35,000 tonnes fertilizers in 2022. Over 27,000 tonnes of recyclable materials were also segregated last year," said the Minister.

He said that as a culmination of its pioneering role in the treatment and recycling of waste, the Center won GCC Award in the field of municipal work at its fourth session, in the category of Best Practices in Waste Management and Recycling.

The Minister said that the Ministry recently disposed of all tire stocks accumulated in the country for many years, after developing a well-studied plan for the safe disposal of discarded tires and finding successful solutions in recycling them at sites. →P4

Roads and Infrastructure in Al Mearad and Southwest of Muaither (Package 3), Roads and Infrastructure in Jervan Nejaima, Roads and Infrastructure in Semaisma Village (Package 1), Roads and Infrastructure in Um Slal Ali. Um Ebairiya Village, South Um Al Amad and North Bu Fessela (Package 1).

In addition, the Bu Samra Border Crossing Project and the Roads and Infrastructure Project in Al Mearad and Southwest of Muaither (Package 2) received the International Safety Award.

Eng. Saoud Al Tamimi. **Roads Projects Department** Manager, said: "This consecutive and distinctive win by Ashghal, one year after another, together with the Local Areas Infrastructure Programme's, winning 8 international health and safety awards for the fourth year successively, prove the Authority's success in reinforcing the principle of maintaining health and safety in its construction projects. It also reflects the Authority's leading position in, and significant impact on, the Qatari construction sector in terms of spreading awareness and disseminating best Health and Safety practices."

CMC ELECTION

Authorities using technology to facilitate voters, candidates

he Supervising Committee of the 7th Central Municipal Council (CMC) elections has capitalised on technology to facilitate voters and candidates, Director of the Ministry of Interior's (MoI) Elections Department, Major General Majid Ibrahim Al Khulaifi, who is also the Supervising Committee's head, said yesterday.

Speaking to QNA, Major General Al Khulaifi said that SMSs replaced all paper receipts for various applications.

The Committee made it possible to submit an electronic voter registration application through Metrash2 app, and to inquire about electoral

registration through Metrash2 app or through the MoI portal, in addition to providing a barcode to locate polling stations, Al Khulaifi added.

He added that the current law regulating the CMC elections does not allow an electronic vote casting and tabulation, voicing hopes for the appropriate legal amendments to expand the use of electronic technologies in the next elections.

He also highlighted all the election phases — preparation, voter registration, candidate registration, election campaigns, up to the voting day on which the votes will be tabulated and election results announced.

Al Khulaifi reiterated the

conditions stipulated by law including that voters must have an original Qatari nationality or have obtained it more than 15 years ago; they must be above 18 years old on May 4, 2023; they have not been previously convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude or dishonesty, unless they have been rehabilitated; and they must be residing in the constituency where they have the right to vote, must not be affiliates of the armed forces or the police

He added that all candidates must be Qatari, and that whoever acquires Qatari nationality must have his father born in Qatar. Candidates must be 30 years or above, fluent in reading and

writing, and among those with recognised competence and honesty, he added.

The conditions according

honesty, he added.

The conditions, according to Al Khulaifi, also stipulate that a candidate must not have been previously convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude or dishonesty, unless they have been rehabilitated; they permanently live and be on the voter lists in the constituency in which they are running for elections; and that they should not be affiliates of the Ministry of Defence or the MoI or any other military agency.

Every constituency has three voting stations, one of which is dedicated to receiving voter registration applications, verifying the required voter conditions, and approving the final voter lists, he said.

Major Gen. Al Khulaifi added that the second committee, known as Election Committee, receives candidate applications, verifies the prerequisite and approves the final candidate lists, in addition to monitoring the votes casting and counting as well as election results announcement.

The third committee examines appeals and grievances submitted to it at various election phases, he added.

Govt measures help reduce occupational heat stress cases

"Qatar has undertaken, since 2019, the implementation of the largest study ever on the effects of occupational heat stress in coordination and cooperation with international partners. The study's findings have contributed to the global understanding of occupational heat stress and provided insights into potential solutions. As a result, the study has made recommendations aimed at improving worker protection," he added.

The Minister said that the world is suffering from the climate change crisis, which affected the entire world, in addition to the challenges related to global warming and its impact on work.

He stressed the importance of holding a series of meetings to discuss ways to prevent the impact of high temperatures on the work environment, as it is one of the priorities of the occupational safety and health policy.

The Minister emphasised MoL's ongoing collaboration with both regional and international partners in the national occupational safety and health system.

"This partnership aims to improve prevention measures and enhance the nation's capacity to monitor heat stress cases," he added.

For his part, Khalifa Khamis Mattar Al Kaabi, Representative of the Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry in the UAE and member of the International Labour Organization Governing Body for West Asian countries affirmed that employers are firmly committed to the issue of occupational safety and health.

He stressed taking appropriate measures to avoid accidents and injuries and protect workers.

"Safeguarding the wellbeing and safety of workers is not solely a moral or legal responsibility but also an essential requirement for achieving sustainable economic growth within countries. It is also crucial for countries that supply a significant portion of the workforce in other nations", he noted.

Bilal Malkawi, Regional Secretary, International Transport Workers Federation said that Qatar has taken a key step towards addressing the impact of occupational heat stress by adopting advanced legislation that is considered a model to be followed at the level of countries in the region.

He appreciated the efforts made by Qatar in the field of protecting workers from the negative effects of heat stress, pointing to the need to adopt a comprehensive approach to occupational safety and health that depends primarily on prevention from the negative effects of different circumstances.

ILO, said that the rise in global temperatures presents challenges that might increase occupational illnesses, which could have adverse effects on workers in both the short and long term.

Heat stress causes a decline in worker productivity, as it is estimated that 2% of the total working hours are lost around the world each year,

according to ILO, she said, noting that there are expectations of a loss of 3 and 5% of working hours in some Gulf countries by the year 2030 due to heat stress.

In addition to that, QASIP expects to encounter specific market needs and socio-economic challenges that come under the interest of Spain and Qatar. Having stated that, it is open for all R&D projects covering many areas like energy, health, resource sustainability, and digital technology.

In terms of funding, QRDI will offer a grant of up to QR1.5m per project including qualifying capital expenditure, manpower, and SMEs.

On the other hand, CDTI will be providing partial reimbursable aid of up to 85 percent of the approved budget. The minimum budget for these fundable activities will be €175,000 (QR43,877). The proposals to submit applications will commence on May 26 and the deadline is on September 7. The finalists and awardees will be announced by February 2024.

Four children among 15 killed in Israeli strikes on Gaza

series of Israeli strikes in the Gaza Strip yesterday killed at least 15 people, with both sides bracing for an escalation.

Islamic Jihad group vowed to "avenge" the deaths in a pre-dawn raid involving some 40 Israeli aircraft.

The first Israeli strike hit targets in the crowded coastal territory for nearly two hours from just after 2am (2300 GMT Monday).

The Gaza health ministry said four children were among those killed and 20 people were wounded, with some in critical condition in the attacks which left buildings ablaze and reduced others to rubble.

The Israeli army said it had targeted three leaders of Islamic Jihad.

Army spokesman Daniel Hagari expressed regret over the death of "uninvolved" people.

Islamic Jihad confirmed the deaths of three senior members — Jihad Ghannam, Khalil Al Bahtini and Tareq Ezzedine — before their bodies were later carried through the streets in mass funeral processions.

The Gaza deaths bring to 123 the number of Palestinians killed in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict so far this year.

A separate air strike in the late afternoon on the city of Khan Yunis in southern Gaza killed two men in a car, the health ministry said.

Following the morning attack, Islamic Jihad vowed to retaliate, with spokesman Daoud Shehab warning that "the resistance considers that all cities and settlements in the Zionist (Israeli) depths will be under its fire".

Hamas chief Ismail Haniyeh, whose movement rules Gaza, said "assassinating the leadership" would bring "greater resistance".

The Israeli military warned residents within 40 kilometres of the Gaza border to stay near bomb shelters until Wednesday evening.

Moscow's diplomatic mission to the Palestinians said one of the dead was a Russian citizen, a doctor who was

killed alongside his wife and one of his children.

Israel last week traded air strikes on Gaza for rocket fire from the enclave, an exchange sparked by the death in Israeli custody of a Palestinian hunger striker with ties to Islamic Jihad, which ended with an Egypt-brokered truce.

Islamic Jihad said yesterday that Israel had "scorned all the initiatives of mediators" and vowed it would "avenge the leaders" killed in the latest air strikes. The group said Ghannam

was secretary of the Al Ouds Brigades military council, Bahtini the military commander in northern Gaza, and Ezzedine a military leader in the West Bank who operated from Gaza.

UN Middle East peace envoy Tor Wennesland said he was "deeply alarmed" by the latest violence and described the killing of civilians as 'unacceptable".

Jordan said it was taking steps to "immediately stop this dangerous escalation". Israel and Gaza militants have fought multiple wars since Hamas took control of the enclave in 2007.

Following the air strikes yesterday, Egypt stated its "total rejection of such attacks" which it said "inflame the situation in a way that could get out of control in the occupied Palestinian territories."

Nineteen Israelis, one Ukrainian and one Italian have been killed over the same period, according to an AFP count based on official sources from the two sides.

Sudan's death toll rises as warring sides continue talks

The death toll from the ongoing clashes in Sudan has risen to 604 people, including civilians, the UN health agency said yesterday. The new figures come as representatives of the warring parties are holding talks in Saudi Arabia.

More than 5,100 people were also wounded in connection with the fighting, World Health Organization spokesperson Tarik Jasarevic told reporters. On Monday, the Sudanese Doctors' Syndicate, which tracks only civilian casualties, said that the fatalities had reached 487.

The conflict started on April 15, after months of escalating tensions between the military, led by Gen. Abdel-Fattah Burhan, and a rival paramilitary group called the Rapid Support Forces, or RSF,

commanded by Gen. Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo.

The fighting has turned urban areas into battlefields and displaced nearly 700,000 people on top of the 3.7 million who had already been internally displaced within the country before the conflict began, according to the U.N. migration agency.

On Monday, the Saudi Foreign Ministry said that talks between delegations of both warring sides were expected to continue for a few more days in the coastal city of Jeddah.

The talks are part of a diplomatic initiative proposed by the kingdom and the United States in hopes of ending the fighting. Meanwhile, Burhan accused the RSF of using residential neighbourhoods as their military bases and civilians as

human shields. In an interview late Monday with an Egyptian TV channel, Al-Qahira Al-Akhbariya, he insisted they must withdraw all their troops from the capital, Khartoum, before any truce

agreement can be reached. "If this is not achieved, there will be no point in going to Saudi Arabia, or engaging in any negotiations," he said. "We won't go ahead with any initiative that does not bring back normalcy and ensure the safety of our citizens."

Also yesterday, the UN special envoy for the Horn of Africa said the conflict is "profoundly" affecting its relations with neighbouring South Sudan. Hanna Serwaa Tetteh told the UN Security Council that the unstable situation has "the potential for more than 200,000 South Sudanese refugees hosted by the Sudan returning home prematurely to a country where two-thirds of the population already needs humanitarian assistance."

Top envoys from Turkiye, Syria to meet in Moscow

The foreign ministers of Turkiye and Syria will hold their first official meeting today since the start of Syrian civil war more than a decade ago, officials said.

The talks in Moscow will also involve the top diplomats of Russia and Iran, Turkiye's foreign ministry said in a statement.

The announcement delivers a diplomatic boost to President Recep Tayyip Erdogan just days before he faces the toughest general election of his 21-year rule on Sunday. A reconciliation with Syria is also supported by Erdogan's opponents and plays an important part in Turkiye's election campaign.

Erdogan has pledged to speed up the repatriation of nearly four million Syrian refugees and migrants who fled to Turkiye to escape poverty and war. An agreement with Damascus is seen as a prerequisite for this process.

Iran and Russia have been helping mediate talks between the two sides.

Ankara said the repatriation will be discussed at the talks. The sides will "exchange views on the normalisation of relations between Turkiye and Syria, discuss humanitarian issues... and the voluntary, safe and dignified return of asylum seekers," the Turkish foreign ministry said.

Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu exchanged a few words with his Syrian counterpart on the sidelines of a regional summit in 2021.

But both sides insisted that this did not mark a resumption of formal talks.

The Moscow meeting follows several rounds of lower-level talks in Moscow involving the four countries' defence ministers.

Turks abroad wrap up voting in landmark election

illions of Turks living abroad wrapped up voting yesterday ahead of Sunday's presidential and parliamentary ballot.

Polls show President Recep Tayyip Erdogan locked in a tight battle with rival Kemal Kilicdaroglu and his alliance of six parties that span Turkiye's cultural and political divide.

The first votes were cast by Turks who moved from poorer provinces to Western Europe over the decades under job schemes aimed at combating the continent's labour shortage in the wake of World War II.

Such voters comprise 3.4 million of Turkiye's 64.1 million registered electorate and tend to support more conservative candidates.

Official turnout on the morning of the last day of overseas voting yesterday was reported at 51 percent a touch lower than in past

Autopsies reveal organs missing in Kenya cult deaths

utopsies on corpses found in mass graves linked to A in mass graves mixed to a religious cult in Kenya have revealed missing organs and raised suspicions of forced harvesting, investigators said, with a fresh round of exhumations resuming yesterday.

The discovery of mass graves last month near the Indian Ocean coastal town of Malindi has stunned the deeply religious Christian-majority country in what has been dubbed the "Shakahola forest massacre"

Police believe most of the bodies belong to followers of self-styled pastor Paul Nthenge Mackenzie who is accused of ordering them to starve to death "to meet Jesus".

While starvation appears to be the main cause of death, some of the victims were strangled, beaten, or suffocated, according to chief government pathologist Johansen Oduor.

Court documents filed on Monday said some of the corpses had their organs removed, with police alleging the suspects were engaged in forced harvesting of body parts. "Post mortem reports have established missing organs in some of the bodies of victims who have been exhumed." chief inspector Martin Munene said in an affidavit filed to a Nairobi court. It is "believed that trade on human body organs has been well coordinated involving several players", he said.

Munene said that Ezekiel Odero, a high-profile televangelist, had received "huge cash transactions," allegedly from Mackenzie's followers who sold their property at the cult leader's bidding.

Horrific crimes against defenseless

DESPITE international condemnation and calls to refrain from barbaric violence, Israel has gone ahead with its horrific crimes against the Palestinians by carrying out deadly pre-dawn strikes on Gaza killing 13 people including four children. The Palestinian health ministry said that 20 people were wounded and some of them are in critical condition.

The fact that this brutal aggression comes at a time during the Universal Periodic Review of Israel at the United Nations shows that Israel doesn't adhere to international laws nor respect or accept the recommendations. The review saw Israel's rights record harshly criticized by most countries who took the floor.

As per media reports many of the nearly 90 countries that took the floor expressed alarm about escalating violence and condemned abuses against Palestinians. AFP reported that some, like the Palestinian representative, and those of Qatar and Namibia, demanded an end to Israel's "apartheid regime", while China's representative maintained the country was "plagued by racism and xenophobia".

Meanwhile, the State of Qatar condemned in the strongest terms the brutal Israeli aggression against the Gaza Strip, considering it a new episode in the series of horrific occupation crimes against the defenseless Palestinian people, especially women, and children. The Ministry warned of the fading chances of peace and the widening cycle of violence due to the provocative Israeli escalation.

It is worth noting that yesterday, the New York-based Committee to Protect Journalists released a report in which they detailed how the Israeli military has systematically evaded accountability in the deaths of journalists over the

The report focused on cases of 20 reporters whose deaths it attributed to the Israel Defense Forces since 2001. No one has been charged or held accountable in any of them. This report was released just ahead of the one-year anniversary of the death of Shireen Abu Akleh, a journalist with Al Jazeera, who was killed while covering an Israeli raid in the occupied West Bank. To date, no one has been charged, disciplined, or otherwise held responsible.

At the UN review diplomats also decried Israel's settlement expansion policies, forced evictions and demolitions of Palestinian homes, and demanded investigations of settler attacks on Palestinians.

All this amounts to nothing if Israel moves ahead with such brute force and violence against Palestinians, which claims the innocent lives of many including children. The international community needs to come together and exert tremendous pressure on this aggressive regime to follow the path of peace and stop violating international law.

Sudan's ethnic conflict, implications

The modern Sudan we know today has essenced from ath-Thawra al-Mahdiyya, or the Mahdist revolution led Muhammad Ahmad bin Abd Allah, who had proclaimed himself the "Mahdi" of Islam (the "Guided One"), against the forces of the Khedivate of Egypt, in 1885, and later against Britain. Eighteen years of war against the Mahdiyya which resulted in the nominally joint-rule state of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan (1899-1956), ended with the de facto control of Britain over the Sudan. The Sudanese launched several unsuccessful invasions of their neighbours, expanding the scale of the conflict to include not only Britain and Egypt but also the Italian Empire, the Congo Free State and the Ethiopian Empire." (Mahdist War, 2023).

"Egypt agreed to share sovereignty over Sudan with the United Kingdom as a condominium. In effect, Sudan was governed as a British

The Egyptian revolution of 1952 toppled the monarchy and demanded the withdrawal of British forces from all of Egypt and Sudan. Under Egyptian and Sudanese pressure, the United Kingdom agreed to Egypt's demand for both governments to terminate their shared sovereignty over Sudan and to grant Sudan independence." The more ethnic, cultural,

and religious identity of the Sudanese people was formed when the Jaafar Nimeiry regime enforced Sharia laws in the country. Research shows that the move "exacerbated the rift between the Islamic North, the seat of the government, and the animists and Christians in the South. Differences in language, religion, and political power erupted in a civil war between government forces, influenced by the National Islamic Front (NIF), and the southern rebels. whose most influential faction was the Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA), which eventually led to the independence of South Sudan in 2011. Between 1989 and 2019, Sudan experienced a 30-year-long military dictatorship of Omar al-Bashir, whose regime was responsible for widespread human rights abuses, including torture, persecution of minorities, allegations of sponsoring global terrorism, and ethnic genocide committed during the War in Darfur region between 2003 and 2020. The war claimed around 300,000 to 400.000 lives. Protests erupted in 2018, demanding Bashir's

resignation, which resulted in a coup d'état on 11 April 2019 and Bashir's imprisonment".

This was followed by the emergence of the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in the political scene of the Sudan. RSF is a militia created and funded by Al Bashir regime to funnel the rebels in Darfur and extract natural resources like gold and other minerals. The RSF is currently involved in armed conflict with the Sudanese Armed Forces in the capital Khartoum, and many other capitals of regional states in an attempt to overthrow the SAF and legitimize itself as the leading military pioneer alongside the civilian undermined government.

The ethnic wars

The most prominent Sudanese war of recent memory is in the region of West Kordofan and Darfur. In 2008, a conflict broke out between the Misseriya and Rizeigat tribes in South Darfur, Sudan. The source of the dispute was a disagreement over land ownership and grazing rights, which had been an ongoing issue for a number of years. The Misseriya, who are primarily nomadic cattle herders, claimed that the Rizeigat tribe had encroached on their grazing lands, while the Rizeigat, who are mainly farmers, argued that they had settled on the land and therefore had a right to use it. The conflict turned violent in February of that year, resulting

Army (SPLA). The SPLA was guarding a United Nations (UN) aid convoy moving along the Sobat River when it was attacked by the Jikany Nuer tribesmen.

The Jikany Nuer reportedly viewed the SPLA's presence in their area with hostility, suspecting that the SPLA was supporting rival factions within their tribe. The Jikany Nuer fighters, armed with weapons like AK-47 rifles, RPGs, and machine guns, assaulted the SPLA convoy in a fierce battle.

The encounter was violent and deadly, resulting in significant losses on both sides. Reports indicate that about 40 SPLA soldiers and 20 Jikany Nuer fighters were killed, and many more were wounded. The UN aid convoy was also targeted, resulting in damage and destruction of several vehicles.

This battle brought to the fore the persisting ethnic tensions, political disagreements, and competition for resources that have fueled conflicts in South Sudan. The SPLA has been involved in multiple confrontations throughout the country's history, including the lengthy civil war between Sudan's north and south. The Jikany Nuer, like many other tribes in South Sudan have been fighting over resources, land, and political power.

The crisis did not stop in the region. Just two months later, 180 people of the Nuer tribe were killed while fishing for

in approximately 70 deaths and the displacement of thousands of individuals. Both sides employed various weapons, including guns and spears, and civilians, including women and children, were targeted in

vicious attacks. The following year, On June 12, 2009, an armed confrontation took place in South Sudan, known as the 2009 Sobat River ambush, involving likany Nuer tribesmen and the Sudanese People's Liberation

food by Murle fighters. The following year saw 184 people die in clashes between the Nuer and Dinka tribes near that region. Later that year, in South Kordofan, 1000 passengers inside cars located at the state of South Kordofan were taken hostage while they were driving to attend the Southern Sudanese Independence referendum. The Messiria had declared that they will maintain their captivity of the hostages until Unity State of South Sudan honors its pledge of blood money. This pledge was made after three Messiria shepherds were killed earlier in the year by tribes from the southern part of the country.

The year 2011 was very active in terms of political unrest and decision making, it saw eight months of constant war throughout the year which tragically claimed 670 lives and displaced tens of thousands of people, The dawn of the year saw the Sudanese People's Liberation Army of the southern region finally achieve its goal of declaring the independence of South Sudan.

Unfortunately, three years later what followed was even more tragedy as armed conflict between rival factions of the military government of Sudan began on 15 April 2023. It started when clashes broke out in western Sudan, in the capital city of Khartoum, and in the Darfur region. As of 25 April, at least 559 people have been killed and more than 4,000 others had been injured. The fighting began with attacks by the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) on key government sites. Airstrikes, artillery, and gunfire were reported across Sudan including in Khartoum. As of 23 April 2023, both the RSF leader Mohamed Hamdan "Hemedti" Dagalo and Sudan's de facto leader and army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan claimed control of several key government sites, including the general military headquarters, the Presidential Palace, Khartoum International Airport, Burhan's official residence, and the SNBC headquarters."

Extreme heat smashes records in Southeast Asia

historic heat wave is bringing largely unprecedented temperatures to Southeast Asia, delivering a dangerous heat stress that could pose grave threats to vulnerable populations and smashing all-time records. Both Vietnam and Laos have recorded their hottest temperatures ever observed, in some places topping 110 degrees Fahrenheit - the latest in a string of global records that fit into the context of a

warming climate. Maximiliano Herrera, a climate historian who tracks temperature records, tweeted that the episode is "one of the most brutal heat event[s] the world has ever witnessed," bluntly writing that "records are being pulverized." In addition to Laos and Vietnam, widespread record heat is gripping Cambodia, Thailand and parts of China.

In some places, the extreme temperatures are fueling severe thunderstorms that have brought flooding as an unwelcome crescendo to the heat. On Saturday, Luang Prabang in Laos made it to 110.3 degrees, beating out its 108.9-degree record set just last month. Laos's capital of Vientiane, home to roughly 1 million residents, made it to 108.5 degrees - its hottest on record. At least half a dozen other weather stations spiked above 40 degrees Celsius (104 Fahrenheit), and virtually every station either broke or came close to breaking all-time records.

degrees on Saturday night, the nation's hottest night on record.

Approximately 18.3 percent of Laotians live in poverty, and are far more likely to be harmed by elevated temperatures. It's likely that significant excess mortality - or premature deaths caused by the intersection of heat stress and preexisting vulnerabilities is occurring across Southeast Asia.

The same is true in Vietnam, where Hoi Xuan hit 111.4 degrees, a nationwide record. The previous record was 110.1 degrees, set in 2019. "Vietnam brutalized nearly every record from north to south," tweeted Herrera. Then Sunday proved even hotter - it reached 111.6 degrees in Tuong Duong.

In Thailand, meanwhile, a temperature station in downtown Bangkok hit 104.9 degrees on Saturday, the highest value ever recorded there. Sunday featured a high of 105.8 degrees. Averaged nationwide, it was Thailand's hottest day on record. Just last month was the first time Thailand had ever recorded a reading of 45 degrees Celsius, or

113 Fahrenheit, anywhere in the country.

Cambodia set a new national May record, with 106.9-degree readings at Kratie and at Ponhea Kraek. Saturday also featured record heat in China, including in Hainan province, which witnessed its hottest day ever observed. Changjiang hit 106.7 degrees.

In the Philippines, extreme temperatures have forced school closures, Bloomberg News reported.

Causing the heat has been a seemingly unremarkable area of high pressure over Southeast Asia. It's a rather typical heat wave, characteristic of this time of year, but pushed into record territory when added to the background of a warming world.

It's especially difficult to get temperatures above 100 degrees in Southeast Asia due to the humidity. That makes air more resistant to warming up or cooling down. The fact that so many records were able to fall is a testament to the unprecedented nature of the air mass. It makes sense that the records are occurring in May, before the monsoon kicks in and brings deeper moisture in the summer months.

There exists a strong link between human-induced climate change and heat waves, which are made more severe, frequent and longer in duration due to the effects of human influence. The past eight years have been the eight warmest on record globally.

Peer-reviewed research indicates that tens of thousands of excess deaths occur annually in Southeast Asia due to extreme temperatures; it's likely that similar tolls may be accompanying this heat wave.

Pakistan's ex-PM Imran Khan arrested, sparking protests

akistan's former Prime Minister Imran Khan was arrested yesterday as he appeared in court to face charges in multiple graft cases, a dramatic escalation of political tensions in the country that sparked demonstrations by his supporters in at least three

Khan, who was ousted in a no-confidence vote in April 2022 but remains the leading opposition figure, was dragged from the Islamabad High Court by security agents from the National Accountability Bureau, said Fawad Chaudhry, a senior official with his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party. Khan was shoved into an armored car and whisked away.

Chaudhry denounced the arrest of the 71-year-old former cricket star as "an abduction." Pakistan's independent GEO TV broadcast video of Khan being hauled away.

Afterward, a scuffle broke out between Khan's supporters and police outside the court. Some of Khan's lawyers and supporters were injured in the melee, as were several police,

Chaudhry said. Khan's party complained to the court, which requested a police report explaining the charges for Khan's arrest.

Khan was taken to the garrison city of Rawalpindi, near Islamabad, for questioning at the offices of the National Accountability Bureau, according to police and government officials. He also was to undergo a routine medical checkup, police said.

Khan had arrived at the Islamabad High Court from nearby Lahore, where he lives, to face charges in the graft

He has denounced the cases against him, which include terrorism charges, as a politically motivated plot by his successor, Prime Minister Shahbaz Sharif, saying his ouster was illegal and a Western conspiracy. Khan has campaigned against Sharif and demanded early elections.

Yesterday's arrest was based on a a new warrant from the National Accountability Bureau obtained last week in a separate graft case for which Khan had not obtained bail, making him vulnerable to arrest. He is scheduled to

UK official visits Hong Kong after years of strained ties

The first British minister visiting Hong Kong in five years said his country will not "duck" its historic responsibilities to people living in its former colony while engaging with China in areas they share common interests.

The remarks by Dominic Johnson, minister of state in the Department for Business and Trade, were published in an opinion piece in the South China Morning Post yesterday. He wrote that the UK will be clear about its right to act when China breaks its international commitments or abuses human rights.

Johnson's trip this week came after relations between Hong Kong and Britain became increasingly tense following the enactment of a Beijing-imposed national security law, which the

Johnson said his trip included meetings with the city's leading investors and government officials to foster investment ties between both sides.

UK earlier called "a clear breach" of the 1984 Sino-British Joint Declaration. The declaration included a promise to retain Hong Kong's rights and freedoms for 50 years after it was returned to China's rule in 1997.

Following the introduction of the sweeping security law in 2020, 105,200 residents have started new lives in Britain via a special visa that allows them to live and work in the UK and apply for British citizenship

after six years, according to U.K. official data. Johnson said his trip included meetings with the city's leading investors and government officials to foster investment ties between both sides. He tweeted on Monday that he met with CK Hutchison chairman Victor Li, the elder son of tycoon Li Ka-shing, to discuss their investment plans in Britain.

In another tweet, he said he also talked to Christopher Hui, Hong Kong's secretary for financial services and the Treasury, on their works to remove market barriers and increase trade between both sides. "I'm in Hong Kong as part of my mission to promote the UK as a leading destination for investment and trade," he wrote on Twitter.

The British consulate in Hong Kong said the visit would allow Johnson to reengage on dialogue including trade and investment, clean growth and future bilateral visits, in addition to promoting collaboration between Hong Kong and the UK after the COVID-19 pandemic and the imposition of the security law.

His visit also includes a meeting with Hong Kong Commerce Minister Algernon Yau, a lunch with some members of the British Chamber of Commerce and a visit to local tech hub Cyberport, it added. Johnson is slated to conclude his trip on Tuesday evening.

When asked about Johnson's visit, Hong Kong leader John Lee said he welcomed any foreign officials to visit Hong Kong and encourage the promotion of economic development, commercial exchanges and people-to-people relationship.

Divisive Thai ex-PM vows to return from exile after polls

Thailand's self-exiled former prime minister said yesterday he wants to return home by July, making his declaration less than a week before the country heads to polls in which his daughter is a frontrunner.

Thaksin Shinawatra tweeted for the second time this month that he would like to come home to see his grandchildren. He said he is prepared to face justice, including several convictions on charges including abuse of power and corruption.

"I have made a decision that I'll go home to raise my grandchildren by this July, before my birthday. Please excuse me. It's been nearly 17 years that I have to be away from my family. I'm already old," he said.

Thaksin, 73, was a populist prime minister when he was ousted by a military coup in 2006. He fled Thailand to escape a prison term in several criminal cases, which he decried as politically motivated. The government of his sister, Yingluck Shinawatra, was also toppled in a 2014 coup led by the current prime minister and candidate in the May 14 election, Prayuth Chan-ocha.

If Thaksin follows through on his pledge to return before his birthday on July 26, he could face at least a decade behind bars. Thaksin is a popular but divisive figure in Thai politics, and there are concerns that his return could be disestablishing.

21 dead after bus plunges off bridge in India

AFP — NEW DELHI: At least 21 people died yesterday when a bus crashed off a bridge in India, officials said, reportedly after the driver fell asleep at the wheel.

The vehicle smashed through a barrier and plummeted around six metres (20 feet) onto a dry river bed south of the central city of Indore in Madhva Pradesh state.

"At least 21 people have died," a senior police official said, without wishing to be named. The dead included three children and 10 women, the Times of India newspaper reported. The bus driver had fallen asleep at the wheel before the crash and had fled the scene, the daily said.

Top Indonesian police officer given life for drug trafficking

AFP — JAKARTA: A high-ranking Indonesian police officer was given a life sentence on Tuesday for trafficking five kilograms (11 pounds) of methamphetamine that was originally confiscated as criminal evidence.

A court in Jakarta found Teddy Minahasa Putra guilty of ordering his subordinate to swap the seized methamphetamine with potassium alum in a plot to illicitly sell drugs.

Putra, who was previously the police chief for West Sumatra province, then trafficked the methamphetamine through a civilian intermediary, the court heard.

Indian villages burned to ashes in ethnic violence

The road to Heiroklian is smooth and freshly laid, with a sign proclaiming it part of an Indian government development initiative. But ethnic violence has reduced the village itself to little more than smouldering ashes.

Sanatomba picked through the ruins of his sister's home in the northeastern state of Manipur, trying to salvage anything of value, but could only recover a traditional stool. "This used to be my sister's kitchen," the 20-year-old says.

"That was her room and she kept her TV there, the fridge there, the almirah (cupboard) for clothes there. But now everything she shared with her husband, four children and other family members is gone forever." More than 50 people have been killed in the hilly border region in clashes between the majority Meitei people, who are mostly Hindus, and the mainly Christian Kuki tribe.

Thousands of troops have been deployed to restore order, while around 23,000 residents have fled their homes for the safety of ad-hoc army-run camps for the displaced. Sanatomba's sibling is among them. They are Kuki, and he is sure she and her family will never be able to

"She told me to come here and look for anything I can find," he says, his hands and feet covered in black soot. The rest of the village suffered a similar fate, its three settlements littered with broken doors, burntdown water tanks, and forced-open metal trunks.

The towering village church, a school building, and even a jackfruit tree were set on fire by the attackers. The raiders stole residents' cattle

and poultry, Sanatomba said.

'Those animals they couldn't take alive, they killed and took away as meat.

"I am afraid of Meitei people." The far-flung states of northeast India — sandwiched between Bangladesh, China and Myanmar — have long been a tinderbox of tensions between different ethnic groups.

The spark for the latest ethnic clash was a protest about plans to

give the Meitei "Scheduled Tribe" status. A form of affirmative action to combat structural inequality and discrimination, that classification would give them guaranteed quotas of government jobs and college admissions.

Violence erupted in the regional capital Imphal and elsewhere, with protestors setting fire to vehicles and buildings. According to villagers, Meitei mobs armed with guns and petrol cans then attacked Kuki settlements in the hills.

Authorities are concerned there could be more reprisal attacks "as both communities have now accumulated weapons", an army officer said. "Are you sure that none of you have any weapons that you would like to surrender?" a senior officer asked a Kuki gathering at a village outside Imphal on Monday.

"The other community has promised to surrender their weapons if you do too," he added. "I want you to consider this as it doesn't help either community to have these weapons in circulation." None of the mostly male audience did so. Thanglallem Kuki, 32, a teacher at a private school, watched from a hilltop as his village of Kamuching was attacked and burned to the ground, spending two nights in the jungle before being rescued and taken to an army camp.

China orders Canadian diplomat expulsion in tit-for-tat response

diplomat yesterday in retaliation for Ottawa ordering a Chinese consular official to leave the country over alleged threats he made against a Canadian lawmaker and his family.

The Foreign Ministry said China was deploying a "reciprocal countermeasure to Canada's unscrupulous move,"

which it said it "firmly opposes." It said Jennnifer Lynn Lalonde, the top Canadian diplomat in the business hub of Shanghai, has been asked to leave by May 13 and that China "reserves the right to take further actions in response." The Canadian Embassy in Beijing had no immediate comment on the expulsion order.

'We understand there is retaliation but we will not be intimidated," Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said after the Chinese move. "We will continue to do everything necessary to keep Canadians protected from foreign interference." Trudeau's government said it is expelling a Chinese diplomat whom Canada's spy agency alleged was involved in a plot to intimidate an opposition lawmaker and his relatives in Hong Kong.

China took control of the former British colony in 1997, and in recent years has effectively ripped up an agreement to maintain its unique political and civil rights for 50 years by gutting its democratic institutions and free press. China regularly uses threats against family members to intimidate critics in the Chinese diaspora.

A senior Canadian government official said Torontobased diplomat Zhao Wei has five days to leave the country. It wasn't immediately clear if Zhao was still in Canada.

Foreign Affairs Minister Mélanie Joly said in a statement that Canada declared Zhao "persona non grata" and that Canada would "not tolerate any form of foreign interference in our internal affairs." "Diplomats in Canada have been warned that if they engage in this type of behavior, they will be sent home," she said.

Canada's spy service indicated that in 2021, opposition Conservative lawmaker Michael Chong and his Hong Kong relatives were targeted after Chong criticized Beijing's human rights record. Canada's spy agency has not released details publicly.

Chong has been critical of Beijing's treatment of members of the Turkic Muslim Uyghur ethnic group in China's Xinjiang region, hundreds of thousands of whom have been detained in prison-like political reeducation

Putin tells WWII event West is waging a 'real war' on Russia

President Vladimir Putin declared yesterday that the West has unleashed "a real war" against Russia, reprising a familiar refrain at scaled-down Victory Day celebrations that may reflect the toll the Ukraine conflict is taking on his forces.

Putin's remarks came just hours after the Moscow fired its latest barrage of cruise missiles at targets in Ukraine, which Russia invaded more than 14 months ago. Ukrainian authorities said air defences destroyed 23 of 25 missiles launched.

The Russian leader has repeatedly sought to paint his invasion of Ukraine as necessary to defend against a Western threat. Kiev and its Western allies say they pose no such threat and that Moscow's war is meant to deter Western influence in a country that Russia considers part of its sphere of influence.

"Today civilization is once again at a decisive turning point," Putin said at the annual commemorations celebrating the defeat of Nazi Germany in World War II. "This is weak. There are no tanks," said Yelena Orlova, watching the vehicles rumble down Moscow's Novy Arbat avenue after leaving Red Square. "We're upset, but that's all right; it will be better in the future."

The Kremlin's forces deployed in Ukraine are defending a front line stretching more than 1,000km, presumably thinning the ranks of troops available for such displays.

"This is supposed to be a showpiece for Russian military might. But so much of that military might has already been mauled in Ukraine that Russia has very little to show on its

parade in Red Square," said Keir Giles, a Russia expert at London's Chatham House think tank.

Meanwhile, the traditional Immortal Regiment processions, in which crowds take to the streets holding portraits of relatives who died or served in World War II — a pillar of the holiday — were cancelled in multiple cities.

"That seems to be for fear that those people who have lost their relatives in this current war on Ukraine might actually join the processions and show just the scale of the casualties that Russia has suffered in its current war," Giles said. Russian media counted 24 cities that also scrapped military parades — another staple of the celebrations — for the first time in years. Regional officials blamed unspecified "security concerns" or vaguely referred to "the current situation" for the restrictions and cancellations. It wasn't clear whether their decisions were taken in coordination with the Kremlin.

On a tribune in Red Square, Putin praised soldiers taking part in the war in Ukraine and urged Russians to stand together.

"Our heroic ancestors proved that there is nothing

stronger, more powerful and more reliable than our unity. There is nothing in the world stronger than our love for the motherland," Putin said.

The guest list was also light amid Putin's broad diplomatic isolation over the war. Initially, only one foreign leader was expected to attend this year's parade — Kyrgyz President Sadyr Zhaparov. That was one more foreign guest than last year, when no leaders went.

At the last minute on Monday, officials announced that the leaders of Armenia, Belarus, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan would head to Moscow as well.

Sunak says UK police independent

K Prime Minister Rishi Sunak insisted yesterday that the country's police forces were "operationally independent", after a backlash about the arrest of anti-monarchists before they could protest at King Charles III's coronation.

Sunak defended London's under-fire Metropolitan Police, which has been widely criticised for detaining six members of pressure group Republic early on Saturday, just hours before the event.

"They (the Met) make the decisions on the ground in the way that they see fit," Sunak told broadcasters.

"That's the way that we've always done it. That's the right way to do it. It wouldn't be right for me to interfere with their operational decisions."

Graham Smith, Republic's chief executive, was among those detained in central London, despite liaising for months with Met commanders before the planned protest.

He claimed he had assurances the demonstration would not be interfered with.

Greenpeace sues Italian energy giant

reenpeace Italy is suing Italian energy giant ENI for its contribution to global warming, it said yesterday, in the latest in a raft of climate lawsuits around the world.

The environmental organisation and fellow green campaigner ReCommon filed the suit along with 12 citizens from areas of Italy severely affected by extreme weather events, Greenpeace said in a statement.

The suit was "for past and potential future damages resulting from its contribution to climate change, of which ENI was well aware but chose to ignore for decades," it said. Greenpeace said ENI's policies were "in blatant violation of the Paris Agreement" signed by Italy.

UN chief says Ukraine peace talks 'not possible' right now

N Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said peace negotiations to end the conflict in Ukraine were "not possible at this moment," in an interview published by Spanish daily *El Pais* yesterday.

His statement came as the leaders of Russia and Ukraine called for victory during events commemorating the end of World War II.

Russian President Vladimir Putin said yesterday at Moscow's Red Square Victory Day parade the world was at a "turning point" and claimed a "war" had been unleashed against Russia.

The day before, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy vowed that Russian forces would be vanquished "just as Nazism was defeated".

Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang is visiting Europe this week as China pushes to act as a mediator in the Ukraine conflict.

Yesterday, Guterres received the Carlos V European Award, given to individuals or organisations that have contributed to the enhancement of Europe's cultural and historical values or to EU integration.

"Universal values, principles and ideas which unite us as the human family... have not been under so much threat since the creation of the United Nations," Guterres said.

"The Russian invasion of Ukraine... cause the country and its population suffering and massive destruction and add to the global economic disruption provoked by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"That's why we have to raise our voice and reaffirm our values. And above all, we need peace," added the 74-year-old former prime minister of Portugal.

Germany, China clash over Ukraine

hina and Germany traded barbs yesterday over Ukraine, with Beijing warning the EU against sanctions targeting its companies while Berlin said "neutrality" in the conflict meant taking Russia's side.

At their second meeting in a month, the foreign ministers of the two countries, Qin Gang and Annalena Baerbock, clashed repeatedly over major powers' responsibilities on the world stage.

Qin warned the European Union against imposing punitive measures again Chinese companies over Russia, saying it would take action to protect their interests.

Referring to discussions within the EU over possible restrictions on eight Chinese companies, he said that if punitive action was taken, "China will also take the necessary response to firmly protect the legitimate interests of Chinese companies".

Chinese and Russian companies enjoy "normal exchanges and cooperation" which "should not be affected", Qin said, following talks in Berlin with Baerbock.

China was "firmly against" other countries imposing their own regulations or taking unilateral action against it, added Qin, who is on a European tour also taking in France and Norway.

EU ambassadors are meeting today to begin discussions on an 11th round of sanctions over Russia's war on Ukraine. As part of the package, the EU's executive has recommended halting exports of sensitive technologies to eight Chinese companies over suspicions they were selling them on to Russia.

The EU wants to crack down on the re-exportation via third countries to Russia of sensitive technology that can be used on the battlefield, such as microchips.

In Berlin, Qin insisted that Beijing

has always pushed for "peaceful dialogue" to end the war in Ukraine.

China will dispatch a special envoy to Ukraine on the matter, he said, urging Germany to do more to push for a ceasefire and peace talks.

But Baerbock pressed Beijing to take a clear stance against Russia, warning that neutrality in the war meant siding with Moscow. "Neutrality means taking the side of the aggressor, and that is why our guiding principle is to make it clear that we are on the side of the victim," she said.

Dozens injured in Polish bus collision in eastern Germany

AP — BERLIN: A highway collision between a long-distance Polish bus and a truck injured dozens of people in eastern Germany, police in Poland and German news agency *dpa* reported.

The crash happened yesterday on the A 12 highway in the state of Brandenburg between the towns of Storkow and Fredersdorf.

German police said 35 people were hurt, including six with severe injuries, *dpa* said. Three helicopters, ambulances and police officers were on the scene, and the section of highway was closed. Police said the truck, which was travelling in the direction of Berlin, collided with the side of the bus when it tried to change lanes.

Italy intends to exit China Belt and Road pact as relations sour

BLOOMBERG — ROME: Italy has signalled to the US that it intends to pull out of a controversial investment pact with China before the end of the year.

Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni reassured US House Speaker Kevin McCarthy during a meeting in Rome last week that while a final decision hasn't been taken, her government is favouring an exit from its role in China's massive Belt and Road Initiative, according to people present at the talks.

Italy signed onto the infrastructure initiative in 2019 when Giuseppe Conte was premier, becoming the only Group of Seven country to become part of the deal. Italy, like much of Europe, has been caught between escalating tensions between Washington and Beijing, which have compounded in light of Beijing's support for Russia.

Thousands rally against violence in Serbia after mass shootings

ens of thousands demonstrated in the Serbian capital Belgrade on Monday, with the protesters calling for the resignation of top officials and the curtailing of violence in the media, after back-to-back shootings stunned the Balkan country.

The "Serbia against

violence" demonstration saw members from across the country's political divide come together after last week's shootings — where 17 people were killed in less than 48 hours, including nine at an elementary school in Belgrade.

"We demand an immediate stop to further promotion of violence in the media and public space, as

well as responsibility for the long-standing inadequate response from competent authorities," the leftist Let's Not Let Belgrade Drown party said in a statement.

The demonstrators gathered in front of the country's parliament before taking to the streets to rally near Serbia's government offices.

Thousands also rallied in the

northern city of Novi Sad, where protesters threw flowers into the Danube river, which flows downstream to the capital.

"We are here because we can't wait any longer. We've waited too long, we've been silent too long, we've turned our heads too long," Marina Vidojevic, an elementary school teacher, told the crowd in Belgrade.

"We want safe schools, streets, villages and cities for all children." The protesters also called for the resignation of a number of top officials — including the interior minister and head of Serbia's intelligence agency.

Following the rally, President Aleksandar Vucic dismissed the protests during a live interview, calling it a "political" stunt.

US readies for migrant influx as Covid-era border rules lapse

The United States is girding for the arrival of thousands of migrants this week, with the expiry of pandemic-era rules that have made claiming asylum at the border all but impossible.

The country's deep divisions over immigration are expected to be laid bare as a wave of people try to get a foothold in a place founded on the promise of safety and shelter, but where a rising tide of nationalism makes the welcome uncertain.

Some migrants escaping economic and political turmoil have already arrived, frustrated by the years-long lack of a legal pathway, squeezing through the holes that pockmark the 3,100km border between the world's wealthiest country and its southern neighbour.

The Texan cities of El Paso, Brownsville and Laredo have declared a state of emergency as they struggle to cope with hundreds of people — most from Latin America, some from China, Russia and Turkiye who are already there.

In El Paso, people sleep on the streets, sheltering from the sun under sheets, or sleeping on cardboard. Children beg for

The city's mayor, Oscar Leeser, said his officials were readying for many more on Friday, judging by a recent tour of the neighbouring Mexican city of Ciudad Juarez.

"On the street we estimated somewhere between eight to 10,000 people," he said.

'There is a caravan... that will be here probably close to May 11, so I say the real number that we'll be dealing with is between 12 to 15,000 people." Overall numbers are far higher, with the US government estimating more than 150,000 migrants were now waiting in northern Mexico, a source familiar with the appraisals told

million people will arrive at the border in the next three months.

With a presidential election 18 months away and immigration a regular fault line in the country's fractious politics, Biden is hoping new rules — and 1,500 active duty troops he has ordered to the border — will help staunch that flow.

"Declaring a foreign diplomat persona non grata is a significant and serious step," Trudeau acknowledged, saying it "demonstrates firmness" of Canada's resolve.

"We will continue to do everything necessary to keep Canadians protected from foreign

interference or fear," he added. The Canadian move followed an outcry in Canada over allegations that Chinese intelligence had planned to target MP Michael Chong and his relatives in Hong Kong with sanctions for sponsoring a motion condemning Beijing's conduct in the

Xinjiang region as genocide. Zhao Wei had allegedly played a role in the intrigue.

Relations between Beijing and Ottawa have been tense since Canada's 2018 arrest of a top Huawei executive and the detention of two Canadian nationals in China in apparent retaliation.

All three have been released, but Beijing has continued to blast Ottawa for aligning with Washington's China policy, while Canadian officials have regularly accused China of interference.

Tensions flared again in recent months, as Trudeau has faced growing pressure to take a hard line on China following revelations that it sought to sway Canada's 2019 and 2021 elections in his party's favour.

US announces \$1.2bn in new military aid for Ukraine

The United States yesterday announced a new \$1.2bn security assistance package for Ukraine to boost the country's air defences and provide it with additional artillery ammunition.

The package underscores the continued US commitment to Ukraine "by committing critical near-term capabilities, such as air defence systems and munitions, while also building the capacity of Ukraine's armed forces to defend its territory and deter Russian aggression over the long term," the Defense Department said in a statement.

The assistance comes in the form of Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative funds, which pay for procurement of equipment from the defence industry or partners rather than providing equipment from existing US stocks.

This avoids depleting US inventories, but means the assistance will take longer to reach the battlefield.

The package features unspecified air defence systems and munitions as well as equipment to integrate Western systems with Ukraine's existing gear, which is mainly of Soviet vintage.

It also includes ammunition for counter drone systems, 155mm artillery rounds, and commercial satellite imagery services.

Texas mall shooter embraced Nazi ideology

The man accused of killing eight people at a Texas shopping mall recently obtained large Nazi tattoos, praised other mass shooters and wrote just ahead of his attack that he would "fight hate with more hate."

Mauricio Garcia, the 33-year-old who police say opened fire with an assault rifle on shoppers at the Allen Premium Outlets mall on Saturday, posted his diaries, photographs of his tattoos, and cryptic warnings of his coming attack on the Russian social media site OK.RU.

His diaries expressed hate for women, Jews, and "diversity," rarely commenting on his own Hispanic

He also posted pictures of his guns, body armour, and patches of

skulls and the initials for "Right Wing Death Squad" popular with far-right militias. But there was no indication that Garcia was a part of any group or had the support of anyone else in his Saturday attack. Garcia was shot dead by a police officer shortly after launching his attack on the busy mall in the suburb north of Dallas, authorities said.

His victims included three members of a Korean-American

family, two sisters of elementary school age, an Indian-American engineer, a security guard at the mall and a 32-year-old man. MSNBC reported that US law

enforcement were examining Garcia's web pages on OK.RU as part of their investigation into the killing. There were strong indications

that the page labelled "PsycoVision5," using a logo of a smiley face with a Hitler-style moustache, was

It included extensive personal pictures, photos of his identity papers, a traffic ticket, and other personal items that closely tied him to the page. Garcia posted photos of tattoos he obtained last month, including a large swastika on his chest and the logo of the Nazi Party's Waffen SS paramilitary body.

Soldier to be sentenced for murder in Texas protest shooting AP - AUSTIN: A US Army sergeant convicted of murder in the shooting death of an armed protester in a Black Lives Matter march in Texas faced up to life in prison when his sentencing hearing began yesterday, even as Gov. Greg Abbott presses for the chance to pardon the soldier. Sentencing for Daniel Perry is scheduled to last up to two days. State District Judge Clifford Brown, who presided over Perry's trial, last week denied his request for a new trial.

Perry, who was working as a ride-share driver the night of the shooting, was convicted in April in the 2020 shooting of 28-year-old Garrett Foster, who was legally carrying an AK-47 rifle through downtown Austin during a summer of nationwide unrest over police killings and racial injustice.

The verdict prompted outrage from prominent conservatives including former Fox News star Tucker Carlson, who called the shooting an act of self-defence and criticised Abbott on the air after he didn't come on his show.

Abbott, a former judge, tweeted the next day that he looked forward to signing a pardon once a recommendation from the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles hits his desk.

El Chapo's son, Sinaloa members face sanctions

The United States yesterday sanctioned a son of Mexican drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman, three members of the powerful Sinaloa cartel and two Mexican-based firms, alleging they trafficked fentanyl and other drugs into the US.

The sanctions came the day Mexican President Andrés Manuel López Obrador was to talk with President Joe Biden by phone about immigration and the fentanyl crisis.

The Treasury Department designated El Chapo's son Joaquin Guzman Lopez and others for financial sanctions, including a freeze on Americanowned assets and bank accounts and a ban on Americans doing

business with them. A Culiacan, Mexico, chemical and lab equipment company and a real estate business also were targeted for sanctions.

The latest penalties by the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control follow a set of April fentanyl trafficking charges brought against three other Guzman sons, Ovidio Guzmán López, Jesús Alfredo Guzmán Salazar and Iván Archivaldo Guzmán Sálazar, known as the Chapitos, or Little Chapos, and two dozen members of the Sinaloa cartel.

Fentanyl is the deadliest drug in the US today. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 71,000 people died in the US from overdosing on synthetic opioids such as fentanyl in 2021.

More firms turning to VR for customer service training

otels, convenience stores and other businesses have increasingly turned to virtual reality to help train their staff amid a growing labour shortage.

VR has an advantage over conventional training manuals and inperson training as it allows staff to repeatedly receive realistic training. The use of VR has attracted attention as a means of maintaining highquality customer service.

In March, convenience store chain operator FamilyMart introduced VR equipment to give store employees customer service training. The employees wear VR goggles and use a controller to learn various tasks, including using the register, ordering products and accepting orders for delivery.

Conventional training requires an instructor to be present to teach the employees the various customer-related tasks at the convenience stores, but with VR, the trainees can learn on their own,

reducing the training time to onethird of the 36 hours normally required. The VR-based training is available in 10 languages, including Japanese, English, Chinese and Vietnamese.

"We hope to improve our customer service, even though we've been short-staffed," said Daisuke Nonaka of the company's store operation management department.

In January, Kyoto College of Hotel, Tourism and Bridal Management in Kyoto developed a VRbased educational programme for hotels and inns. The programme walks students through such tasks as working the front desk and

taking restaurant reservations. The program is designed in a way so the scenarios change depending on the responses from the trainees, allowing them to learn to handle various situations while interacting with different virtual guests.

The manufacturing, automobile and railway industries have taken the lead in introducing VR-based training in the areas of inspection and repair. VR has become an effective tool to allow staff to physically memorize procedures and safely experience some of the inherent dangers of the job.

Amid a serious labor shortage, the food service and lodging industries have increasingly launched VR training programmes to improve efficiency.

The National Institute of Advanced Industrial Science and Technology in Tsukuba, Ibaraki Prefecture, has been researching and developing VR-based training since 2018. In February, the institute established guidelines for VR-based training for customer service. The guidelines include key points regarding reducing training costs, allowing companies to effectively teach their staff without the financial burden.

'The biggest challenge in the food service industry is cultivating staff," said Takashi Okuma, a research team leader at the institute. "We hope the new technology will help reduce the burden and improve efficiency in the entire

The move comes as Musk tries to ramp up engagement, and opportunities to make money, at the online platform he bought for \$44bn last

"We're purging accounts that have had no activity at all for several years, so you will probably see follower count drop," Musk said in a tweet.

Musk-mandated changes at Twitter from slashing staff to doing away with free verification check marks seen as stamps of authenticity have alienated users and advertisers.

Twitter's blue ticks were reinstated on some media, celebrity, and other high profile accounts late in April -- a move protested by many of the recipients.

Musk tweeted at the time that he was "paying for a few (subscriptions) personally." Many official media accounts regained a tick, including AFP, which has not subscribed to Twitter Blue. The reinstated ticks did not lure back US public radio NPR, which in mid-April suspended activity on its accounts.

Barbara Kingsolver, Hernan Diaz win fiction Pulitzer Prizes

The Pulitzer Prize for fiction was awarded Monday to two classconscious novels: "Demon Copperhead," Barbara Kingsolver's modern recasting of the Dickens classic "David Copperfield," and Hernan Diaz's "Trust," an innovative narrative of wealth and deceit set in 1920s New York.

It's the first time the Pulitzers have awarded two fiction books in the category's 105-year history. Officials have declined to name a fiction winner several times, mostly recently in 2012.

"Trust" won the Kirkus Prize for fiction, was on the long list for the Booker Prize and was named by *The New York Times* and The Washington Post as one of the year's best books.

Kingsolver's novel, the story of a young boy's struggles

and persistence as he grows up in southern Appalachia, was chosen by Oprah Winfrey last fall for her book club and named by The Washington Post as a top release of 2022.

The 68-year-old Kingsolver has long woven social issues into her novels and helped establish the PEN/Bellwether Prize for Socially Engaged Fiction. Speaking by phone Monday, the author said she regards the Pulitzer as an affirmation not just of her novel, but of a misunderstood and overlooked part of the country. Kingsolver is a longtime resident of Appalachia who currently lives on a farm in southwestern Virginia, and set "Demon Copperhead" close by.

"I wrote this book for my people because we are so invisible to the rest of the world and so persistently misrepresented," Kingsolver said. "I couldn't be happier (about the Pulitzer) for this reason.

Diaz, also interviewed by phone, sees his book and Kingsolver's novel approaching a similar subject, class, from different perspectives. "Demon Copperhead" dramatizes life on the lower end of the extreme divide between rich and poor. "Trust," which begins with a novel-within-the novel about a financial tycoon and his daughter, explores how such a world is created.

"I wanted to talk about the process itself of the accumulation of wealth," said Diaz, 49, whose debut novel "In the Distance" was a Pulitzer finalist. "I wanted to deal with class and money, and how money is really made." Several works with racial themes were honoured Monday. Beverly Gage's "G-Man," her widely acclaimed book on longtime FBI leader J. Edgar Hoover, was given the Pulitzer for biography.

40-YEAR-OLD SAGA

Nintendo banks on 'Zelda' to boost fortunes

apanese video game giant Nintendo is banking on the latest instalment of its 40-year-old saga "Zelda" to breathe life into its business, after forecasting a drop in profits this year.

The firm will release "Tears of the Kingdom" on Friday, with clips circulating on the internet already racking up millions of views and generating feverish excitement among fans.

The saga of Princess Zelda and the elf-like warrior Link has shifted 125 million copies worldwide since its first edition in 1986.

It helped to forge "open world" games where the player is free to roam in virtual landscapes -- an idea later taken up by games from "Grand Theft Auto" to "Skyrim".

But its main challenge this year will be to boost the figures for the Japanese studio and prolong the life of its Switch console, which experts say is in its dotage after seven years on the shelves.

The game "will be by far the biggest contributor to Nintendo's sales this year", said Serkan Toto, an analyst at Kantan Games.

Yet the franchise was

something of a risk during the 1980s for a company that also boasts the "Super Mario" series as part of its stable.

The first episode, "The Legend of Zelda", plunged gamers into an unknown universe largely without instructions. Creator Shigeru Miyamoto,

who also gave life to Mario,

was inspired by his childhood explorations of the Japanese countryside to offer a landscape of forests, lakes, caves and mountains. "The scale of the game was

huge at a time when most games were finished in an hour or two," said Kiyoshi Tane, an author specialising in the history of video games. "The map was designed

with a real emphasis on exploration, so it was something of a pioneer of what open-world games would become." The first Zelda hit the market only a few months after "Super Mario Bros", but the two games were far apart on the gaming spectrum.

The game was a smash hit from the off, and for the next two decades it pushed the boundaries of game design.

The 1998 edition "Ocarina of Time" pioneered a system to allow gamers to aim properly in 3D.
