Meet calls for protection of children in conflicts

The regional conference on preventing grave violations against children in armed conflicts kicked off virtually yesterday, in coordination with the League of Arab States and the Office of the Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Children and Armed Conflict. The State of Qatar hosts the event as president of the 42nd meeting of the Council of Arab Ministers of Social Affairs.

Bringing together Their **Excellencies Arab Ministers of** Social Affairs, the conference will discuss the best regional practices for preventing grave violations against children in armed conflicts and highlight ways to boost regional cooperation.

Addressing the conference, Minister of Social Development and Family H E Maryam bint Ali bin Nasser Al Misnad said the conference aims to discuss

governments' views and ideas that help crystalise a unified international and Arab position on the issue of preventing grave violations against children in armed conflicts.

She added that the world is facing a complex and deep crisis that threatens the future of childhood amid the rising

intensity of armed conflicts, and the absence of peaceful solutions to them, prompting those in charge of humanitarian and development work to harness further efforts and accelerate their coordination to limit the exacerbating humanitarian situation in countries suffering scourge

peaceful dialogue and to define guarantees for the protection of children and human rights during conflicts. Children remain the group most affected by the absence of

armed conflict, to impose

clear mechanisms to protect them during wars and conflicts, specifically those from povertystricken spots, including refugees and displaced persons, as the groups that suffer the greatest share of gross violations and exploitation, she said.

Al Misnad highlighted that the Middle East showed 79 percent of violations against children due to armed conflict, with 93,000 children having been recruited in armed conflicts and more than 25,000 children kidnapped by armed men between 2005 and 2020. The same period also documented 14,000 cases of child rape or forced marriage at the hands of the parties to the conflict, Her Excellency highlighted. **→P3**

Submitting appeals, grievances on candidates registration for **CMC** elections begins: Mol

¬he Ministry of the Interior (MoI) announced the start of submitting appeals and grievances stage regarding the registration of candidates for the 7th Central Municipal Council (CMC) elections starting Sunday and ending on June 6.

The ministry said that the period for submitting appeals and grievances began yesterday at all electoral district headquarters, from 4 to 7pm. The statement referred to the appeal

and grievance procedures, which include the right of the candidate to complain about not being included in the lists of candidates. The voter or candidate in his constituency has also the right to challenge the registration of a candidate because he/she does not meet the requirements.

An appeal or grievance request shall be submitted in writing on the designated form provided that it shall include the basis of the request. The appeal or



grievance request shall be submitted then to the chairman of the Appeals and **Grievances Examination Committee** with a receipt, the statement added.

The Committee for the Examination of Appeals and Grievances regarding the registration of candidates will decide on them within seven days from the date of their submission, provided that the final lists of candidates will be announced on Sunday, June 11.

On Thursday, the stage of receiving applications for registration of candidates for the Central Municipal Council (CMC), which lasted for five days in 29 electoral locations, concluded.

Hungary wants to build strategic ties with Qatar: PM

Prime Minister of Hungary H E Viktor Orban affirmed his country's keenness on building a strategic partnership with Qatar in different fields in light of the growing relations between the two countries.

In an interview with QNA, Orban said that Qatar-Hungary relations are steadily growing, with several strategic aspects of cooperation that are of high priority to both the countries, including energy, agriculture and infrastructure, especially with relation to air transport in addition to the collaboration in the security and military fields. These fields have been set and agreed upon, he added.

Orban noted that energy cooperation is of utmost importance to Hungary, which seeks to purchase Qatari LNG after 2026, adding that cooperation in agriculture will be a valuable opportunity for the

He said the air transport sector would be the priority on infrastructure, with discussions about the possibility of attracting Qatari investments to this sector, especially airports.

On the round of political consultations between the two countries held in March, he explained that they dealt with two issues — the preparation for his (current) visit to Qatar and the issue of exempting Qataris from the Schengen visa, which, Hungary — as a member of the European Union, — strongly supports.

Orban noted that

Qatari-Hungarian relations are based on mutual respect, and political and economic cooperation. He said that since his first time in office in 1999, he has shown keenness to strengthen relations with Qatar and established strong ties with its leadership.

As for political cooperation between the two countries, there is a common belief in the importance of preserving sovereignty and playing an active and influential role at the regional and international levels, he stressed.

He emphasised that cooperation between the two countries is moving forward to build collaboration and a strategic partnership, especially since Qatar has made great strides in economic and social development, indicating that this enhances Hungary's aspirations for cooperating in a way that serves the country, which is dynamically developing in parallel with the countries of Central Europe.

Relatedly, Orban praised Qatar for supporting Europe's energy security, saying that such support reflects the extent of economic interdependence and interrelation in common economic and strategic interests.

He added that he has significantly benefited from the advice and expertise of the wise leadership in Qatar on many issues and matters of concern to his country. "We also benefit from the Qatari legislative system, and we intend to transfer the experience to Hungary, including, for example, the management of expatriate

workers, especially as we are going to study this issue in the parliament," he added.

He also praised Qatar's pivotal political and humanitarian role in building peace through mediation and assisting governments in development efforts, stressing that Qatar has succeeded in mediating in many crises, reflecting its political weight and effective diplomacy.

According to Orban, the humanitarian assistance provided by Qatar to countries in need reflects on global security and stability and reduces illegal immigration and the associated human tragedies.

He called on countries to open up and cooperate to solve crises, consolidate economic, trade and investment relations, and encourage cooperation between universities so that all regions would have equal opportunities for development, progress and modernisation.

This complex situation requires doubled efforts and cooperation among all countries of the world, including the Arab countries, to protect children from being exploited, especially in armed conflicts, she said, warning that distorted childhood, poverty and ignorance make appropriate incubators for extremism, terrorism and urge to revenge.

Moreover, the Minister added that childhood in areas of armed conflict generates major future psychological and physical disabilities that exhaust societies and establish the inheritance of poverty and ignorance.

She stressed that Qatar is always ready to coordinate and cooperate with Arab countries and the world to support people suffering from armed conflicts, including the Sudanese people, and stop the deterioration of social and humanitarian conditions and end the crisis that threatens the future of childhood and the world. In a similar statement, H E Arab

League's Assistant Secretary General and head of social affairs sector Ambassador Dr. Haifa Abu Ghazaleh said the Arab League prioritises the issue of preventing heinous violations against children in the armed conflict to achieve the best interest of children, adding that the Arab Childhood Committee periodically follows up on this issue.

She underscored the Arab League's keenness to develop joint work mechanisms to curb the challenges facing children since they are among vulnerable segments affected by wars and economic and social crises, as well as providing full protection to them. Qatar's steps to protect children in armed conflicts highlighted

inister of State for International Cooperation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs H E Lolwah bint Rashid Al Khater presented Qatar's initiatives to protect children in armed conflicts during a regional meeting on preventing grave violations against children in armed conflicts.

It was hosted by Doha yesterday via videoconferencing technology. In a speech during the meeting's second session titled "Regional best practices on preventing grave violations against children in armed conflicts," Al Khater said Qatar is proud of its experience in mediation to resolve armed conflicts by peaceful means in accordance with the principles of justice and international law.

Oatar was able to end many armed conflicts and achieve peace, and it continues this role in other armed conflicts, she added.

Qatar, she said, is also proud that it initiated the submission of a draft resolution to the 74th session of the United Nations General Assembly entitled "International Day to Protect **Educational Institutions from** Attacks." The draft resolution stipulates that September 9 of each year be considered a global day to protect education from attacks, and urges the

international community to alleviate the ordeal of students affected by armed conflict. The draft resolution was adopted unanimously and the day was marked on September 9, 2022 for the third year.

She referred to Qatar's partnerships with regional organisations and many international partners to enhance the protection of children affected by conflict.

In this context, she noted the Qatar Fund for Development's provision of permanent support to the Office of UN Special Representative of Secretary-General for Children and Armed Conflict, in addition to Qatar's support to establish and finance the **Analysis and Communication** Center of the Office of the Special Representative in Doha in order to support mediation and capacitybuilding to end and prevent grave violations against children in armed conflict.

Her Excellency also noted many initiatives launched by Qatar to support international peace and security, including but not limited to its hosting in 2021 of approximately 260 Afghan minors during the process of evacuating Afghan citizens to the State of Oatar and then to their final destinations. During the period of their stay in the country, alternative care and psychological and social support were given to them, she said.

In a related context, Al Khater referred to the Education Above All Foundation initiative Educate a Child which provided education to ten million children in developing countries affected by armed conflict, and the Women in Conflict Zones Initiative 2022 launched by the Oatar Fund for Development with the aim of supporting and empowering women and girls in the regions that witness conflicts and wars around the world.

Currently, Qatar chairs the main group of the support platform dedicated to the solutions strategy for Afghan refugees (SSAR), she said, noting that there are many other initiatives and efforts, all of which stem from Qatar's strategic vision in supporting international and regional peace and security and achieving lasting peace and development for all peoples.

an urgent appeal for humanitarian assistance from the peoples of the Horn of Africa, who are facing unprecedented drought, due to deep crises.

Sheikha Alya said that according to UN agencies, more than 32 million people in Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia are acutely food insecure, and that more than 43 million people are in need of urgent humanitarian assistance this year, including more than eight million children and pregnant woman facing acute malnutrition. She underlined that unfortunately, the funding of the Humanitarian Response Plan 2023 so far is insufficient, and therefore, it is necessary for the international community to take decisive action to address this crisis.

In this context, she said that at the High Level Side Event: Responding to the Urgent Humanitarian Needs in the Horn of Africa, the State of Qatar pledged \$12m in humanitarian aid. In implementation of this pledge, Qatar Fund for

Development (QFFD) and Qatar Charity launched an urgent response project to help those affected by the drought

in Somalia, she added. Qatar's Permanent Representative to the UN noted that QFFD is funding the second phase of the "Building Resilient Communities in Somalia" project (BRCIS) in cooperation with the British Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) and the US Agency for International Development (USAID) in Somalia.

Sheikha Alya explained that the project aims to enhance the delivery of humanitarian aid to rural communities in the Republic of Somalia, especially those most vulnerable to disasters, pointing out that this was achieved by providing multisectoral assistance to 594,618 beneficiaries over a period of six months.

She also said that the Qatar Fund for Development is finalising a joint project with USAID and Unicef in Somalia, with a

total value of \$12m. in which QFFD and USAID contributed \$6m, adding that this joint effort aims to meet the urgent needs arising from the outbreak of measles and cholera in Somalia.

In the same context, she indicated that the Education Above All Foundation (EAA) is implementing joint projects to provide quality education for 7.5 million outof-school children and youth in Africa, with the total budget for these projects amounting to \$1.2bn.

He added that Katara will devote its role as a hub of Arabic calligraphy and spread its





s business owners or consumers, Awe are either demanding or seeking sustainability, but we do not always agree on what it looks like. Kahramaa launched Tarsheed; a rigorous campaign to reduce water and electricity consumption in the residential sector. Qatar Foundation established Earthna; a non-profit center to inform and influence both national and global sustainability policy. Most recently, the Ministry of Municipality announced a plan to distribute waste segregation containers to every household in the next five years to push for recycling. The efforts are ever-evolving and they are admirable.

There are so many guiding principles when it comes to striving for sustainable development. There are the 5C's; Clean, Community, Culture, Care and Corporate Governance. Others position it as the harmony of three core pillars: economic growth, social inclusion, and environmental protection.

Although it may be challenging to agree on what exactly 'sustainability' looks like, it's fair to say it can be applied to practically all aspects of our lives, which is why there are multiple variables to the sustainability equation. Then there's the freedom for a lot more women to dress in designer names and something



different, without the financial commitment that comes with having to make new purchases every single time!

Which brings me to why I often say and believe, indelg is not just a brand that's a rental service, it's a verb. Unlike indulging, which gives way

MoECC to organise workshop on climate vulnerability assessment in Qatar

The workshop aims to educate stakeholders about the 'Climate Change Adaptation' project, discuss the data collection process and its potential benefits to Qatar's broader development efforts, share preliminary findings of

climate vulnerability assessment, and its impact on the mentioned sectors, as well as prioritization, and discussing the scope of proposed adaptation measures to address identified impacts using a set of criteria.

The workshop also gives priority to discussing appropriate adaptation measures to address the effects of climate change. GGGI projects to make Qatar more resilient against climate change

The Global Green Growth Institute (GGGI) is working closely with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC) to implement a number of projects to make Qatar more resilient in addressing climate change.

The projects include climate change adaptation, circular economy, tracking greenhouse gas emissions (MRV or measurement, reporting, and verification), capacity building, and green growth pathway development.

In an interview with *The Peninsula*, Helena McLeod, Deputy Director-General and Head of the Green Growth Planning & Implementation (GGP&I) Division at GGGI, said GGGI Qatar Office, which opened in January 2022, is providing technical assistance to the government through policy advisory, investment planning, and capacity building in green growth.

She said GGGI's role is to serve as a trusted advisor, contributing to meeting Qatar's climate action such as reducing emissions in line with their global commitments in the Paris Agreement.

"One of the GGGI's priorities in Qatar is to fast-track the development of a comprehensive MRV system that will enable Qatar to monitor and measure its greenhouse gas emissions especially in energy, transport, industry, and waste sectors," said McLeod. She said MRV system allows accurate submission and measurement of emissions, which is a requirement of the international climate change agreement.

'That is the highest priority that the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change has for us this year, because they have to submit a formal document and report which accurately tells the world what their emissions are in the country in those different sectors," said McLeod. She said GGGI is also working on the circular waste, circular economy and how to manage waste sustainably. "We are also working with the MoECC on the financial sector to make it greener and more sustainable — promoting resilience and green economic growth. change, emission reduction but also, for instance, protecting the country's biodiversity and the country itself from climate change," McLeod added.

She said GGGI operates in 40 countries worldwide across Latin America, the Caribbean, Africa, Asia Pacific, Middle East and Europe. GGGI advises host governments, provides technical assistance, analysis and presents recommendations on what's best for a country.

She noted that after evidence is gathered, and recommendations are made, it is down to the government to take a decision on what they're going to enforce in law or in policy and

how it can be implemented.

"Here, we are working for the government as partners, with the government in the lead. So we come with our ideas, our knowledge, our advice, but it is up to the government to decide what is in the best interests," McLeod stressed. Regarding consumption. McLeod said rationalising energy consumption would greatly help in protecting the environment which could be achieved by influencing the behaviour of people. She said that every simple way of saving resources makes people aware that there is a benefit to the environment by using a bit less energy.

For instance, running air conditioning at a comfortable level and using efficient water taps would save energy and resources.

"Qatar is a fascinating country because it's relatively small in terms of population, but it really made remarkable achievements internationally. Qatar is helping less well-off countries as well in addressing climate change. We've also discussed with the Qatar Fund For

Development (QFFD) about where to do some work for developing countries." Speaking about the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022, she said Qatar built the most climate-smart stadiums as part of the tournament.

They also invested, for instance, in e-buses to curb emissions. McLeod said the World Cup was also about being futuristic, being cutting edge, and breaking new grounds.

"I think that's something they can also bring to this whole climate debate. How can we protect our history and our people? How can we look forward with the latest technologies and find those solutions and find the solutions at a scale that makes a difference for the world?" On projects being carried out in Qatar, McLeod said, GGGI partners with Qatar on projects outside the country. She cited a Qatar-funded project in the Pacific.

"This is related to working with entrepreneurs who are in green businesses or sustainable businesses and helping them flourish and get bigger. It's working in really poor countries that are very vulnerable to climate change.

HMC marks World Hemophilia Day with awareness, educational events

In recognition of World Hemophilia Day, Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) in collaboration with the Friends of Hemophilia Society recently hosted a series of awareness and education events for HMC staff, as well as for hemophilia patients and their families.

This year, the theme for World Hemophilia Day is "Access for All: Prevention of bleeds as the global standard of care." World Hemophilia Day provides an ideal opportunity to educate patients and healthcare professionals about the condition, which is an important part of building community support for individuals living with bleeding disorders.

The awareness events for healthcare staff took place at HMC's Hajar Auditorium at the Medical Education Center on May 24, while additional events were held at Rixos Gulf Hotel Doha on May 26 and targeted

hemophilia patients and their families.

Dr. Ahmed Abdulaziz Abdelbari, Clinical Pharmacist at Hamad General Hospital, said the event at Hajar Auditorium was held in the presence of Dr. Usama Al Homsi, Senior Consultant in Medical Oncology and Deputy Medical Director for Clinical Research, Education and Quality at HMC's National Center for Cancer Care and Research; Cesar Garrido, President of the World Federation of Hemophilia (WFH); and Rana Saifi, WFH Regional Manager the Eastern Mediterranean.

The event also gathered a number of local and international experts who delivered lectures on hemophilia, including Dr. Miguel Escobar, Professor at McGovern Medical School at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston (UTHealth); Dr. Haroon Mann, Consultant Trauma and Orthopedic Surgeon from London; Dr. Laim Ferrnough; Dr. Hasan Abu

Hejleh; and Mr. Mohamed Rafique. Also in attendance were a number of physicians and surgeons from HMC's Departments of Surgery, Orthopedics, Hematology, and Intensive Care, as well as pharmacists from Hamad General Hospital.

Dr. Abdelbari said the lectures focused on strategies to safely perform surgeries on patients with blood disorders. He noted that Qatar's health system offers state-of-the-art healthcare facilities and equipment, as well as highly experienced care teams, both of which are essential for better health outcomes for patients with hemophilia.

"Hemophilia can greatly affect the quality of life of patients and their families. Males are generally more likely to have hemophilia than females. Hemophilia is often linked to genes inherited from the mother, a genetic mutation, pregnancy, or malignant diseases such as cancer," said Dr. Abdelbari.

He also highlighted the importance of the lectures that were delivered on the second day of the events and mainly targeted people with hemophilia and their families. The lectures offered health tips and medical information on hemophilia, including its causes, symptoms and complications, diagnosis, and methods of prevention and treatment.

Hemophilia is a rare genetic disorder that results from the deficiency or absence of one of the clotting factors in the blood (proteins).

This can cause bleeding for a longer time than normal following injury. For example, if a healthy person who does not have hemophilia sustains injuries, the body will collect blood cells to form a clot that stops bleeding by sealing off damaged blood vessels and preventing excessive blood loss, while people with hemophilia have a deficiency or absence of one of the clotting factors, which leads to a heavier or longer bleeding.

PHCC offers health tips for school students ahead of exam season

ith students' exam period approaching, the Primary Health Care Corporation (PHCC) has offered advice for students to safeguard their health and help improve their academic performance.

"It is necessary to know how to properly prepare for exams to overcome anxiety during exams and get better grades," said Dr. Sarah Bakhamis, Family Physician and Manager of PHCC's Al Mashaf Health Center.

Students focus all their attention on studying and neglect their health. Dr. Bakhamis advised students to eat healthy, be sure to drink fluids while studying, such as water and fresh fruit juices, and exercise, as they are good for their brains. Students can walk outside the house for a short distance, as it helps reduce stress.

Dr. Bakhamis reminded students with chronic diseases, such as asthma, abnormal blood pressure, or diabetes to bring their medications to school to avoid feeling unwell during exams.

during exams.

She also advised students to practice breathing techniques, to inhale and exhale, and relaxation techniques, get enough sleep at night, walk while studying from time to time, every 5 or 10 minutes, avoid sitting for long periods in the same place or bending over wrong that could negatively affect the back and neck, and avoid constantly focusing on computer screen or other

electronic devices.

Dr. Bakhamis added that

Dr. Bakhamis added that studying late at night is not effective, as students are not giving their brains a rest, making it difficult to recall information.

studying late at night is not effective, as students are not giving their brains a rest, making it difficult to recall information. Staying up late also leads to severe fatigue, exhaustion, and stress. Further, overtaking stimulants may increase heart rate and affect concentration skills.

She noted that the best

She noted that the best time to study is during the early morning hours and from 5pm to 8pm and advised students to sleep for no less than 6-7 hours before the exam for reasons related to metabolism, memory stabilization, calming nerves, to help raise their academic performance and improve their focus during the exam.

On the night before the exam, Dr. Bakhamis recommended reviewing summaries of the material, covering the important points that students have prepared instead of studying. She advised students to take a minute to make sure that they remember and understand the topic well before they move to another topic.

Dr. Bakhamis said that students should prepare the equipment they need for the exam ahead of time and to have their breakfast meal early in the morning to avoid being late for school.

Erdogan wins historic run-off vote, thanks all Turks

¬urkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan won his reelection bid, beating rival Kemal Kilicdaroglu in the historic run-off vote yesterday.

The head of Turkiye's election commission declared Erdogan the winner. "Based on provisional results, it has been determined that Recep Tayyip Erdogan has been elected president," Supreme Election Council chairman Ahmet Yener was quoted as saying by the Anadolu state news agency.

"All 85 million of our citizens are the winners of both the May 14 and May 28 elections," Erdogan said in an address to the nation from Istanbul after his victory. "We said 'We will win in a way that no one will lose.' So the only winner today is Türkiye," he stressed.

On May 14, no candidate won the required 50% in the first round, triggering the presidential runoff, although Erdogan took the lead with 49.52%. Erdogan's electoral alliance also won a majority in

parliament on May 14. 'We have completed the second-round presidential

nation," Erdogan said, expressing his gratitude to the people of Türkiye. "I would like to thank each

With more than 99% of ballot boxes opened, unofficial results from competing news agencies showed Erdogan with 52% of the vote, compared with 48% for Kilicdaroglu.

were celebrating even before the final results arrived, waving Turkish or ruling party flags, and honking car horns and chanting his name. Celebratory gunfire was heard in Istanbul several neighbourhoods.

Erdogan's performance came despite crippling inflation and the effects of a devastating earthquake three months ago.

Hungary's Prime Minister Viktor Orban and Russian President Vladimir Putin congratulated Erdogan, along with leaders from Qatar, Venezuela, Azerbaijan, Pakistan, Libya, Algeria, Serbia and Uzbekistan.

In Ankara, Erdogan voter Hacer Yalcin said Turkiye's future was great. "Of course Erdogan is the winner ... Who else? He has made everything for us," Yalcin said. "God blesses us!'

Erdogan, 69, is set to remain in power until 2028.

He transformed the presidency from a largely ceremonial role to a powerful office through a narrowly won 2017 referendum that scrapped Turkiye's parliamentary system of governance. He was the first directly elected president in 2014, and won the 2018 election that ushered in the executive presidency.

Sultan of Oman visits Tehran, meets Raisi

man's Sultan H M Haitham bin Tarik, whose Gulf country has been a long-time mediator between Iran and the West, arrived in Tehran yesterday for a two-day visit.

His trip comes just two days after Tehran freed Belgian aid worker Olivier Vandecasteele from almost 15 months in custody in exchange for diplomat Assadollah Assadi.

The Gulf Sultanate helped facilitate the prisoner swap.

The Sultan was greeted on arrival at Tehran's Mehrabad

airport by First Vice President Mohammad Mokhber and later met President Ebrahim Raisi at the Sadabad palace in north Tehran. Ahead of his visit, the newspaper Asharq Al Awsat quoted Omani Foreign Minister Sayyid Badr Hamad Al Busaidi as saying it comes "in pursuance of constructive cooperation and consultation about different issues on the regional and international arenas".

The Omani leader's visit comes a year after Raisi visited Muscat, and follows a Chinabrokered rapprochement deal between Saudi Arabia and Iran announced in March.

Busaidi said Oman was optimistic the sultan's "historic" trip to Iran would be "beneficial in regional and global terms".

Oman has close ties with Iran, and played a mediating role between Tehran and the United States in the build-up to a nuclear deal Iran and world powers reached in 2015.

The sultanate was reported to have hosted secret US-Iran talks ahead of the signing of the deal known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, or JCPOA, which gave Iran relief from international sanctions in return for curbs on its nuclear programme.

Saudi, US call on Sudan sides to extend 'imperfect' ceasefire

The United States and Saudi Arabia have called on warring sides in Sudan to extend a fragile cease-fire due to expire today (Monday), as weeks of fighting reached a stalemate in the capital and elsewhere in the African country.

The Sudanese army and a rival paramilitary force, battling for control of Sudan since mid-April, had agreed last week to the weeklong truce, brokered by the US and the Saudis. However, the

cease-fire, like others before it, did not stop the fighting in the capital of Khartoum and elsewhere in the country. In a joint statement early yesterday, the US and Saudi Arabia called for an extension of the current truce which expires at 9:45pm local time todav.

"While imperfect, an extension nonetheless will facilitate the delivery of urgently needed humanitarian assistance to the Sudanese people," the statement said.

The statement also urged Sudan's military government and the rival Rapid Support Forces to continue negotiations to reach an agreement on extending the cease-fire.

The fighting broke out in mid-April between the military and the powerful RSF. Both military chief Gen. Abdel Fattah Burhan and RSF leader Gen. Mohammed Hamdan Dagalo led the 2021 coup that removed the Western-backed government of Prime Minister Abdalla Hamdok.

The conflict has killed hundreds of people, wounded thousands, and has forced nearly 1.4 million people out of their homes to safer areas.

Somalia to allow direct universal suffrage in 2024

nomalia's government and federal member states said yesterday that direct universal suffrage would be introduced with local elections set for June 2024.

The move follows a pledge by President Hassan Sheikh Mohamud in March to end a complex indirect system in place since 1969.

"The basic principles should be that the election of the Federal Somali Republic must be one that gives the public the opportunity to cast their votes democratically in a one-person, one-vote system," the government said after reaching an agreement with state leaders.

The reform aims to "encourage the multiparty political system" that is independent and "corruption free", it added.

Somalia is struggling to emerge from decades of conflict and chaos, but is battling a bloody insurgency and natural disasters including a punishing drought that has left millions facing hunger.

The country has not had one-person, one-vote elections nationwide since 1969, when the dictator Siad Barre seized power

Instead, clan affiliations have been the organising principle of Somali politics, with influential roles such as speaker, prime minister and president divided among the main groups.

State legislatures and clan delegates also pick lawmakers for the national parliament, who in turn choose the president.

But rivalries between the clans have resulted in decades of strife and political wrangling, which in recent years have been exploited by the Al Shabaab militants aligned with Al Qaeda.

Why doesn't Europe grieve deaths in the Mediterranean?

ccording to an April 12 report by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) of the United Nations, at least 441 refugees drowned in the Central Mediterranean between January and March 2023, making it the deadliest quarter since 2017. "The persisting humanitarian crisis in the Central Mediterranean is intolerable," said IOM Director General António Vitorino in response to the figures.

However, we do, in fact, tolerate these deaths.

This is evident by IOM's dismal statistics. The organisation's Missing Migrants Project has recorded nearly 25,000 drownings in the Mediterranean Sea since 2014. The true death toll is likely to be much higher.

Notwithstanding this, European authorities have not made any genuine attempts to create safe and legal routes for asylum seekers to Europe. To the contrary, recent years have seen further asylum restrictions and criminalisation of search and rescue activities. Moreover, the European Union-funded Libyan coastguard and the Greek coastguard both engage in regular and illegal pushbacks of refugee boats trying to cross the Mediterranean. This has all made seeking protection in Europe increasingly more dangerous.

That Europe is willing to accept these deaths is also indicated by the mild reactions reports of new shipwrecks and mass drownings spark. Apart from a small number of humanitarians and activists, hardly anyone protests against these deaths. And besides the usual condemnations from political figures, there is hardly any display of public grief or outrage.

What explains European leaders and citizens' widespread acceptance of non-white refugees drowning in our backyard? Compassion fatigue? In 2015, the now-iconic image of the lifeless body of the Syrian toddler Alan Kurdi washed ashore on a Turkish beach went viral. The image incited empathy and solidarity with refugees across Europe, and political leaders expressed their personal grief and determination to act. Eight years later, news and imagery of children and adults drowning in the Mediterranean no longer seem to prick our consciences.

A common explanation is compassion fatigue: previously engaged citizens are too emotionally exhausted to care, or we feel helpless and powerless by constant news stories of tragedy and suffering. Others have observed that European attitudes to refugees changed towards the end of 2015, after the attacks in Paris and sexual assaults in Cologne.

Judith Butler argues, the question of whose lives are grievable is also intimately related to the question of whose lives are considered worth living and valuable in the first place. "An ungrievable life is one that cannot be mourned because it has never lived, that is, it has never counted as a life at all," Butler wrote in her 2009 book Frames of War. Her analysis suggests that we have come to tolerate the routine drowning of non-European refugees because their lives and deaths "simply do not touch us, or do not appear

It is also essential not to lose sight of history. During my fieldwork in Greek refugee camps, aid workers and volunteers often described Europe's border policies as violating the continent's liberal-democratic history and ideals. On the other hand, many refugees portrayed the widespread acceptance of or suffering at the border as a sign of European hypocrisy. As Zekria Farzad, a teacher from Afghanistan who founded his own school and humanitarian organisation in Moria camp, asked: "Where are Black Lives Matter now?" While the question is pertinent, moral contradictions and double standards are inherent features of European liberalism. Indeed, despite talk of freedom and equality as

European liberal democracies have always considered their freedom and security contingent on controlling or excluding non-white others. This both shapes and legitimises contemporary border policies, described by the French philosopher Étienne Balibar as an attempt to institutionalise a

"European apartheid". What can we do? This year has had a deadly start for refugees crossing the Mediterranean. At least 600 people have died or have gone missing in the Mediterranean in April and May so far, in addition to the high death tolls between January to March. What can we do? IOM's Vitorino has called for urgent and more effective state-led search and rescue operations. Meanwhile, humanitarian organisations like Doctors Without Borders (Medecins Sans Frontieres, or MSF) have long urged European authorities to provide safe and legal crossings of land and sea borders into the EU. Both actions are important and will require political mobilisation and activism.

However, they are insufficient.

To challenge the normalisation of refugee deaths in the Mediterranean, we must address why they are seen as less deserving of grief than the deaths of white Europeans.

This requires antiracist work. We should also reexamine the stories we tell and share about displaced people. Rather than portraying refugees as suffering victims stuck in the present, we should give them space to express their personal experiences of loss and plans, their aspirations for the future; and more. Their stories deserve to be heard; just as their lives deserve to be protected, and when lost, grieved.

Addressing the causes We must also change how we address and respond to the mass drownings in the Mediterranean. Like Vitorino, many humanitarian actors describe these drownings as a "humanitarian crisis" or "tragedy". Very often, refugees are also described as "unfortunate people" who happen to be born in places where conflict or poverty is rampant. This language conceals how the repeated deaths of people trying to seek better lives and safety in Europe are the results of willed democratic politics and, therefore, avoidable.

We must always hold our elected politicians accountable. Besides calling for humanitarian evacuations or safe passage, we must also mobilise for political and institutional changes, including greater freedom of movement and mobility justice.

Lastly, whereas protecting the right to asylum is crucial, we must address the structural and political causes that lead people to risk their lives for a safer and better future. These causes include war, conflict and natural disasters, but also so-called "slow killers" like extreme poverty and global inequality, climate change and food insecurity.

More attention to these root causes should push us to examine our historical and political complicities as citizens, consumers and beneficiaries. It might also lead us to expand the legal definition of a refugee to include people escaping from extreme poverty and climate change not only war and persecution.

Nevertheless, we must counter the stigma attached to "economic migrants". There is nothing morally wrong with seeking a better life in a new country. Millions of European citizens did just that when they emigrated to the United States between 1820 and 1920.

It was acceptable then, and must be just as acceptable now.

Soaring prices of academic journals

ubscription fees for academic journals in which scholars publish their research results have soared worldwide, and universities are struggling to deal with the situation. The government needs to take specific measures to prevent this trend from causing stagnation in research activities.

Researchers are judged by the number of papers they publish and how often their work is cited by other papers. To ensure their findings are published in the world's leading academic journals and to allow their researchers to reference other scholars' work, leading universities spend hundreds of millions of yen each year on subscriptions for overseas academic journals and other publications.

In some cases, universities pay journal publishers several hundreds of thousands of yen to have a researcher's paper published online.

It can be said that the publication of research documents is an important process, serving as a starting point for disseminating new knowledge and technology to society.

In recent years, however, subscription fees for such journals have risen, placing a growing financial burden on universities. In fiscal 2021, universities across the nation paid subscription fees totaling 32.9 billion yen for electronic editions alone, a rise of Publishers have contributed to research activities by making papers and data widely available. It is essential for such companies to aim for a business model that supports development in academic circles, rather than solely focusing on chasing profits.

Publishers have explained that editorial costs have increased due to a rise in the number of papers, for example, but universities are concerned that subscription fee hikes could strain their limited research funds and lead to a decline in research

capabilities. Nearly half the world's academic papers run in journals published by three major European and U.S. companies, including a German company that publishes the scientific journal Nature. This oligopoly makes price competition difficult. As a result, universities have to maintain their subscriptions to such journals despite the high

To address this situation, the Japanese government is considering such measures as submitting publicly funded research papers to government-related servers to be published for free, while subsidizing related fees. It is noteworthy that the government is serious about taking specific measures to deal with the issue. National universities and other entities

have already set up websites to publish papers independently, but such sites lack the clout of major academic journals. Even if the universities were to consolidate their sites, it would be no easy task to gain global recognition.

Additionally, providing publication fee subsidies to young researchers unable to raise funds to publish their research would not change the fact that public funds are being diverted out of Japan. It is difficult to say that this approach would serve as a fundamental solution.

It is difficult for universities to negotiate with publishers who hold a dominant position. It is said that in some European countries, government teams are leading such talks. For its part, Japan should not leave such negotiations to concerned universities alone, but rather, should create a government-driven system to ensure uni-

China's first homegrown passenger jet makes maiden flight

hina's first domestically produced passenger jet made its maiden commercial flight yesterday, a milestone event in the nation's decades-long effort to compete with Western rivals in the air.

Beijing hopes the C919 commercial jetliner will challenge foreign models like the Boeing 737 MAX and the Airbus A320, though many of its parts are sourced from abroad.

Its first homegrown jetliner with mass commercial potential would also cut the country's reliance on foreign technology as ties with the West deteriorate.

'In the future, most passengers will be able to choose to travel by large, domestically produced aircraft," state broadcaster CCTV said.

China Eastern Airlines flight MU9191 from Shanghai "arrived smoothly" in Beijing just after 12:30 pm, around 40 minutes ahead of schedule, according to

CCTV. Footage showed passengers filing out of the plane and into the terminal, before a few dozen staff and officials posed for photographs in a brief ceremony on the tarmac.

"(The flight) was extremely smooth, comfortable and memorable. I think I'll remember this fondly for some time to come," a male passenger told CCTV.

The broadcaster had aired footage of the plane rising into the skies above Shanghai Hongqiao Airport on Sunday morning, saying it had 130 passengers on board.

State media footage showed passengers gathering at the sun-drenched Shanghai airfield

to admire the sleek white jet before embarking.

Passengers received red boarding passes and a sumptuous "themed meal" to commemorate the flight, CCTV reported. Other footage showed passengers waving national flags and singing a patriotic song while a cake was being cut during the flight.

China has invested heavily in production of the homegrown jet as it seeks to become self-sufficient in key technologies.

The aircraft is manufactured by state-owned Commercial Aircraft Corporation of China (COMAC), but many of its parts including its engines — are sourced from overseas.

Zhang Xiaoguang, COMAC's director of marketing and sales, told state news agency Xinhua the flight was a "coming-of-age ceremony (for) the new aircraft", adding the C919 "will get better if it stands the test of the

operate on China Eastern's regular route between Shanghai and the southwestern city of Chengdu, CCTV reported.

The first model of the narrow-body jet was formally handed over to China Eastern last year during a ceremony at an airport in Shanghai, hailed by state media as "an important milestone" for the country's aircraft industry.

Zhang Yujin, COMAC's deputy general manager, told state-backed Shanghai outlet The Paper in January that the company had taken around 1,200 orders for the C919.

S Korean arrested for opening plane emergency exit door, faces up to 10 years in prison

man who opened an emergency exit door during a flight in South Korea was formally arrested yesterday and faces up to 10 years in prison on a charge of violating the aviation security law, officials said.

During a preliminary questioning, the 33-year-old told investigators that he felt suffocated and tried to get off the plane quickly, according to police.

Twelve people were slightly injured on Friday after he opened the door of the Asiana Airlines Airbus A321-200, causing air to blast inside the cabin and terrifying passengers. Some testified they suffered severe ear pain and saw others screaming and crying. A video shared on social media shows passengers' hair being whipped by air blowing into the cabin.

Normally, the emergency exit doors cannot be opened mid-flight due to the difference in air pressure inside and outside of the aircraft. But during Friday's incident, the man succeeded in opening the door likely because the plane was flying at a low altitude while preparing to land and there wasn't much difference in pressure, according to

Asiana Airlines officials. The Transport Ministry said the plane was at 700 feet (213 meters) when the man pulled the door open. The plane was preparing to land in Daegu on an hour-long flight from the southern island of Jeju with 200 people on board. They included teenage athletes on their way to a track and field competition,

according to Asiana Airlines. Yesterday, a district court in Daegu approved a warrant to formally arrest the man.

Police earlier sought the arrest warrant, citing the graveness of the crime and a possibility the man may flee, according to Daegu police.

"I wanted to get off the plane soon," the man, whose face was covered by a black hoodie, a cap and a mask, told reporters at the court ahead of its review of his arrest warrant. "I'm really sorry to kids," he said, in a likely reference to the

teenage athletes. Daegu police said they have up to 20 days to investigate the man before determining whether to send him to prosecutors for a possible indictment. If convicted, he faces a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison for breaching the aviation security law that bars passengers from handling entry doors, emergency exit doors and other equipment on board, according to the Transport Ministry.

Daegu police said the man, surnamed Lee, told them that he was under stress after losing a job recently and that he wanted to get out of the plane soon because he was feeling suffocated just before landing.

The people who were taken to hospitals were mainly treated for minor problems such as breathing difficulties.

Asiana Airlines said in a statement that starting from Sunday, it stopped the sale of emergency exit seats on its 174-seat A321-200 planes and the 195-seat A321-200s as a safety precaution.

70 years after first summit, Everest keeps giving

7hen Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay Sherpa first climbed Everest 70 years ago, they paved the way for thousands of foreign climbers to try to follow in their footsteps.

The eight-day trek to the Everest base camp is among the most popular multi-day hikes in Nepal, with tens of thousands of tourists making the journey every year.

What were small agrarian villages when the British expedition passed through in 1953 have since been transformed into tourist hubs with hotels, tea houses and equipment shops, boosting the livelihoods of local communities.

In many homes, three generations have found employment in mountaineering — a far more lucrative occupation than farming or yak-herding.

The work is hazardous by

definition, but in a climbing season of about three months, an experienced guide can make up to \$10,000 — several times the country's average annual income.

And other Sherpas and Himalayan community members have opened restaurants and guesthouses that line Everest's money trail.

Veteran mountain guide Phurba Tashi Sherpa was born and raised in Khumjung, a village about 10 kilometres (6.2 miles) from base camp.

He grew up watching his father and uncles go to the mountains for work, and soon joined them on expeditions, eventually climbing Everest 21 times before he retired.

"There would be just a few expeditions before but now there are so many every year," he said.

"That means an increase in income. It has helped improve the lifestyle here. A lot has changed."

Since the first British teams set their sights on summiting Everest in the 1920s, Nepali climbers — mostly from the Sherpa ethnic group — have been by their side.

"Sherpa" became synonymous with high-altitude guiding as they became the backbone of the multimilliondollar industry, bearing huge risks to carry equipment and food, fix ropes and repair ladders. Now local expedition groups — instead of playing second fiddle to foreign climbing agencies -- bring the bulk of paying clients into Nepal.

And a younger generation of Nepali climbers is slowly being recognised in their own right. Renowned Italian climber Reinhold Messner told AFP in a 2021 interview that it was a well-deserved climb up the

"It is an evolution," he said. 'And this is also important for the future economy of the country."

About 40 killed in fresh clashes in northeast India, savs official

round 40 suspected militants and two Amilitants and two police have died in fresh violence in Manipur in northeast India, an official told AFP yesterday, confirming comments from the state premier to local

Manipur has been on edge after an explosion of inter-ethnic violence this month killed at least 70 people and left tens of thousands displaced.

The state government official, who did not wish to be named, said that Manipur chief minister N. Biren Singh told reporters earlier on Sunday that security forces killed around 40 "militants" over the last two days.

"The terrorists have been using M-16 and AK-47 assault rifles and sniper guns against civilians. They came to many villages to burn down homes," local media quoted Singh as saying. "We have started taking very strong action against them with the help of the army and other security forces. We have got reports some 40 terrorists have been shot dead," Singh was quoted as saving.

A military source confirmed an uptick of unrest, and said four people had been killed in the past 24 hours.

Most Thais concerned of new govt formation

The majority of Thais are concerned the nation's next prime minister won't hail from the Move Forward Party, which is forming a pro-democracy coalition to govern after winning a combined majority in this month's election, according to a Suan Dusit Poll.

Despite cobbling together an alliance of eight parties that commands a majority in the House of Representatives, the coalition doesn't have the 376 parliamentary seats needed to bypass the 250member, military-appointed Senate that also gets to vote on the next premier.

The bloc still needs considerable backing from senators to ensure that Move Forward Party leader Pita Limjaroenrat becomes the nation's 30th prime minister. At least 19 senators have agreed to back Pita, according to Move Forward Deputy Leader Sirikanya Tansakun.

Until there is a new prime minister, the caretaker government is headed by Prayuth Chan-Ocha, the general who led the 2014 coup and has held power since.

Modi opponents boycott opening of new Indian Parliament

'ndia's major opposition parties yesterday boycotted the inauguration of a new Parliament building by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in a rare show of unity against his Hindu nationalist ruling party, which has ruled for nine years and is seeking a third term in

next year's elections. Modi inaugurated the new Parliament in the capital of New Delhi by offering prayers as Hindu priests chanted religious hymns. Opposition parties criticized the event saying Modi had sidelined President Droupadi Murmu, who has only ceremonial powers but is the head of state and highest constitutional authority.

Shortly after the inauguration, a visibly beaming Modi entered Parliament amid a rousing applause by his party lawmakers who chanted "Modi,

Modi." He delivered an almost 40-minute speech in which he hailed India's parliamentary democracy and said the country had left behind its colonial past, referring to the old Parliament building that was built by the British when they ruled India.

"India is the mother of democracy," Modi said, as lawmakers thumped their desks. "Several years of foreign rule stole our pride from us. Today, India has left behind that colonial mindset."

The opposition Congress party leader Rahul Gandhi

tweeted: "Parliament is the voice of the people. The Prime Minister is considering the inauguration of the Parliament House as a coronation."

At least 19 opposition parties skipped the event, which coincided with the birth anniversary of a Hindu nationalist ideologue. Opposition parties said in a statement Wednesday that Modi's decision to inaugurate the building was "a grave insult" to India's democracy, because the government had "disqualified, suspended and muted" opposition lawmakers while passing "controversial legislation" with little debate.

"When the soul of democracy has been sucked out from the parliament, we find no value in a new building," the parties said.

India's powerful Home Minister Amit Shah said the opposition had politicized the event. Other leaders from Modi's party said the boycott was an insult to the prime minister. The new triangular-shaped

building - built at an estimated cost of \$120 million - is part of a \$2.8 billion revamp of Britishera offices and residences in central New Delhi that will also include blocks of buildings to house government ministries and departments, and Modi's new private residence. The entire project, called the "Central Vista," is spread over 3.2 kilometers (1.9 miles).

The project was announced in 2019, and Modi laid the foundation in December 2020.

The plan has drawn intense criticism from opposition politicians, architects and heritage experts, many of whom called it environmentally irresponsible, a threat to cultural heritage and too expensive.

Outrage grew in 2021, when at least 12 opposition parties questioned the project's timing,

saying it was built as the country faced a devastating surge in coronavirus cases. They branded the revamp as Modi's "vanity project" and said its construction was prioritized over the loss of lives and livelihoods during the pandemic. A year earlier, a group of 60

former civil servants wrote an open letter to Modi to highlight the architectural value of the old Parliament and said the new plan would "irrevocably" destroy the area's cultural heritage. Modi's government has said the overhaul was necessary because the older building was "showing signs of distress and overutilization" and that the new design "combines the country's heritage and traditions.'

The new building sits just across from India's old Parliament, a circular structure designed by British architects in the early 20th century.

Russia launches 'largest drone attack' on Kiev

krainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy yesterday praised his country's air defence forces, after the capital Kiev saw the largest drone attack since the beginning of the Russian invasion.

The overnight attack killed two people and wounded three others.

The latest drone attack came as Russia has intensified aerial strikes on the capital this month, and warned the West against escalating the conflict after the United States agreed to greenlight F-16 deliveries.

Ukraine said the latest attack in Kiev was "the most important" of the invasion, with more than forty out of 54 drones targeting the capital.

"Every time you shoot down enemy drones and missiles, lives are saved... you are heroes!" Zelenskiy told his air defence forces yesterday morning, also thanking

attack on the Ukrainian capital by Russia this month.

"People are in shock. There's a lot of damage, the windows were broken, the roof was damaged," said Sergei Movchan, a 50-year-old resident whose house was damaged by debris.

Kiev had been relatively spared since the beginning of the year, but in May its residents have had to live with almost nightly air raid sirens and thundering explosions.

"Russians are intimidating us. But I think it's the agony of their regime," Movchan said.

In Kiev the air raid alert lasted more than five hours as the attack was carried out in several waves.

Kiev's mayor, Vitali Klitschko described the assault as "massive" with drones "arriving from several directions at once".

The Kiev military administration said that "more than 40 Russian drones were destroyed by air defence" systems in the "most important drone attack against the capital since the start of the invasion" in February 2022.

Authorities reported that two killed and three others wounded as debris of the downed drones fell in several districts. Sunday was to be celebrated as Kiev's city day, usually marked by street concerts and celebrations.

"Today the enemy decided to 'congratulate' the population on Kiev Day with the help of their killer drones," the authorities said.

Congratulating residents on Kiev Day, presidential chief of staff Andriy Yermak said the capital had "stood up" to Russia.

"Kiev, a city of free and brave people, has become a symbol of Ukraine's

unbreakable spirit and the Kremlin's failed imperial ambitions," Defence Minister Oleksiy Reznikov said.

Ukraine's air force said that "a record" of 54 drones were launched from the regions of Briansk and Krasnodar in Russia, adding that 52 were destroyed. It said Russia used Shahed drones from Iran, and presidential aide Mykhaylo Podolyak to vow new sanctions against Iran.

After Kiev long asked for advanced warplanes, the United States on Friday said it would allow Kiev to acquire F-16 fighter jets, the most sophisticated material yet sup-

plied by the West.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov yesterday said Western nations were "playing with fire" by agreeing to supply Ukraine with F-16.

Lavrov called the move an "an unacceptable escalation" of the conflict, in a TV interview posted on social media.

US, allies slam Kosovo after clash with Serb protesters

The US and top European allies condemned Kosovo's government following clashes between police and ethnic Serbs that erupted when protesters tried to block ethnic-Albanian mayors from reaching their offices in the north of the country.

Kosovo police used teargas to disperse the crowds, which included demonstrators opposed to the officials taking office following local elections last month that the ethnic-Serb community boycotted and called invalid.

In an unusually sharply worded statement, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken denounced the authorities for accessing the buildings "by force" and said they had done so "against the advice of the United States and Kosovo's European partners."

"These actions have sharply and unnecessarily escalated tensions, undermining our efforts to help normalize relations between Kosovo and Serbia and will have consequences for our bilateral relations with Kosovo," Blinken said in a statement."

The UK, France, Germany and Italy also denounced Kosovo's government, saying it had acted "despite our call for restraint."

"We call on Kosovo's authorities to immediately step back and de-escalate," they said in a joint statement. It also expressed concern over "Serbia's decision to raise the level of readiness of its Armed Forces at the border with Kosovo"

They had previously urged Kosovo to avoid deepening tensions via overt displays of authority.

Starmer plans to block new North Sea projects: The Times

When asked if Labour planned to block new North Sea energy projects, shadow Work and Pensions Secretary Jon Ashworth said the party would be announcing details on its energy policy in the coming weeks.

"But we know we've got to move to more renewable sources of energy, it's important for our climate change commitments," Ashworth said during an appearance on Sky News's Sophy Ridge on Sunday. "It's also the way in which we can bring energy bills down for consumers." Labour would continue to use existing oil and gas wells over the coming decades and manage them sustainably as it works to transform the UK into a clean-energy superpower, the newspaper said.

paniards were voting yesterday in local and regional polls seen as a barometer for a year-end general election which surveys suggest Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez will lose, heralding a return of the right.

The stakes are high for Sanchez, whose Socialist party governs the eurozone's fourth-largest economy in coalition with the far-left Podemos.

Voters are casting ballots for mayors in 8,131 municipalities while also electing leaders and assemblies in 12 of Spain's 17 regions - 10 of which are currently run by the Socialists.

Voting opened at 9am (0700 GMT) with some 35.5 million people eligible for the local elections and 18.3 million for the regional elections. Balloting ends at 8pm.

With no exit polls, initial results are due out two hours later.

"Most of our citizens will vote positively... for what is important: for public healthcare, public education and housing policies for our young people," said Sanchez as he cast his ballot in Madrid.

If the left "exceeds expectations and manages to retain control of most regional governments in play... this would suggest the national elections will be very closely fought, and bode well for the left's chances of staying in power", Eurasia Group analyst Federico Santi said this week.

But if surveys — which forecast a shift to the right — prove correct, success at a regional level will provide opposition leader Alberto Nunez Feijoo, head of the right-wing Popular Party (PP), with the "momentum" he needs to win the end-of-year election,

he said. After casting his ballot, Feijoo urged people "to vote massively" and ensure the next government was a strong one.

Yesterday's elections find Sanchez, who has been in office since 2018, facing several obstacles: voter fatigue with his left-wing government, soaring inflation — even though Spain's rate is lower than other EU nations — and falling purchasing power. Feijoo has denounced Sanchez as not only pandering to the far left but also to the Basque and Catalan separatist parties on which his minority government has relied for parliamentary support.

He has positioned Sunday's vote as a referendum on "Sanchismo", a derogatory term for Sanchez's

policies.
In his campaign closing remarks,
Sanchez focused on his government's
record in bolstering the economy,
fighting drought and managing Spain's
increasingly sparse water resources.

"Social democratic policies suit Spain a lot better than neo-liberal policies because we manage the economy

a lot better," he said.

Of the 12 regions where new leaders will be elected, 10 are currently run by Socialists, either alone or in coalition. The number of regions the PP manages to wrest from the Socialists will be important in determining public perceptions of whether Feijoo has won this first round — and whether his victory in the year-end general election is a foregone conclusion.

Seven charged over Northern Ireland policeman shooting

AFP — BELFAST: Seven men have been charged over the shooting of an off-duty police officer in Northern Ireland earlier this year, investigators said on Saturday.

Some of the defendants will face terrorism charges, while all stand accused of attempted murder. Detective Chief Inspector John Caldwell, a high-profile officer who has led major investigations, survived the late-February attack, in which he was shot multiple times at a sports centre.

He had been coaching a youth football group which included his son, in the town of Omagh in the British province.

The shooting, condemned by politicians as "outrageous and shameful", was carried out by two men. Seven have now been charged, officers said.


"Two men aged 28, and five men aged 33, 38, 45, 47 and 72, have been charged with attempted murder," the Police Service of Northern Ireland (PSNI) said in a statement.

Medical row in France over unauthorised COVID-19 trial

AFP — PARIS: French medical bodies yesterday called on authorities to punish researcher Didier Raoult for "the largest 'unauthorised' clinical trial ever seen" into the use of hydroxychloroquine to treat COVID-19.

Raoult, the former head of the IHU Mediterranee research hospital, and his subordinates engaged in "systematic prescription of medications as varied as hydroxychloroquine, zinc, ivermectin and azithromycin to patients suffering from COVID-19... without a solid pharmacological basis and lacking any proof of their effectiveness," a group of 16 research bodies wrote in an op-ed piece on daily Le Monde's website

The drugs continued to be prescribed "for more than a year after their ineffectiveness had been absolutely demonstrated," they added.



Over 1,500 arrested at climate protest in The Netherlands

McCarthy, who spoke with Biden on Saturday to close the deal, said there was still "a lot of work to do, but I believe this is an agreement in principle that's worthy of the American people."

The Republican speaker added he would consult again with the president yesterday and oversee final drafting of the

relief plan. Biden said "the agreement represents a compromise, which means not everyone gets what they want. That's the responsibility of governing." - Deadlines -Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen had initially warned of a possible default around June 1 if Congress failed to raise the ceiling on borrowing, but gave lawmakers some breathing room on Friday when she updated the deadline to June 5.

Even so, the legislation will still have to clear Congress much more quickly than the normal timetable for even the most uncontroversial bills.

Under House rules, lawmakers have to be given 72 hours before voting once a bill is presented. And if it passes the House, it will then have to go through the Senate, where Democrats hold the majority.

McCarthy is hoping to bring the narrow House majority of 222 Republicans with him, but the deal is likely to face opposition from 35 far-right lawmakers who told him to "hold the line" against compromising on far more sweeping spending cuts. That means a large number of Democrats will have to be persuaded to vote with a reduced number of Republicans — something that rarely happens on big bills.

Three killed, 5 wounded in **US** bike rally shootout

t least three people were killed and five **L**others wounded in a shootout at a biker rally on Saturday in the US state of New Mexico, local media reported.

The shooting occurred around 5pm (2300 GMT) as 20,000 bikers took part in an annual Memorial Day motorcycle rally in Red River, a small town near the ski destination of Taos.

In a video interview with local outlet Questa Del Rio News, Red River Mayor Linda Calhoun confirmed the deaths and injuries, and said an unspecified number of suspects had been arrested.

"No law enforcement, no first responders were injured. No local people were injured... It was a gangrelated incident," she said, declining to divulge which gangs were believed to be involved.

The shooters have all been apprehended," she added. The Taos News reported that a law enforcement officer had referred to the incident over central dispatch as "a rolling shootout —between Banditos (Motorcycle Club) and someone else." Speaking to local ABC affiliate *KOAT*, one witness described chaos breaking out in the huge crowd.

"There were people running by where we were standing, screaming, 'There's shooting down there," said Eddie Cook. "As everybody was running by, then I heard the gunshots." The shooting prompted the mayor of Taos to put a curfew in place between the hours of 10pm and 4am.

Texas House votes to impeach Republican Attorney General

Texas' GOP-led House of Representatives impeached state Attorney General Ken Paxton on Saturday on articles including bribery and abuse of public trust, a sudden, historic rebuke of a fellow Republican who rose to be a star of the conservative legal movement despite years of scandal and alleged crimes.

The vote triggers Paxton's immediate suspension from office pending the outcome of a trial in the state Senate and empowers Republican Gov. Greg Abbott to appoint someone else as Texas' top lawyer in the interim.

The 121-23 vote constitutes an abrupt downfall for one of the GOP's most prominent legal combatants, who in 2020 asked the US Supreme Court to overturn President Joe Biden's electoral defeat of Donald Trump. It makes Paxton only the third sitting official in Texas' nearly 200-year history to have been

wrongdoing. House investigators said the attorney general's own probe into Paxton's actions includes false and disproven claims.

"No one person should be above the law, least not the top law enforcement officer of the state of Texas," Rep. David Spiller, a Republican member of the committee that investigated Paxton, said in opening statements. Rep. Ann Johnson, a Democratic member, told lawmakers that Texas' "top cop is on the take." Rep. Charlie Geren, a Republican committee member, said without elaborating that Paxton had called lawmakers and threatened them with political "consequences." As the articles of impeachment were laid out, some of the lawmakers shook their heads.

Paxton has been under FBI

investigation for years over accusations that he used his office to help a donor and was separately indicted on securities fraud charges in 2015, though he has yet to stand trial. Until this week, his fellow Republicans had taken a muted stance on the allegations.

Lawmakers allied with Paxton tried to discredit the investigation by noting that hired investigators, not panel members, interviewed witnesses. They also said several of the investigators had voted in Democratic primaries, tainting the impeachment, and that they had too little time to review evidence.

I perceive it could be political weap onisation," said Rep. Tony Tinderholt, one of the House's most conservative members. Republican Rep. John Smithee compared the proceeding to "a Saturday

mob out for an afternoon lynching." Paxton is automatically suspended from office pending a Senate trial, and it falls to Republican Gov. Greg Abbott to appoint an interim replacement. Final removal would require a two-thirds vote in the Senate, where Paxton's wife's, Angela, is a member.

Texas' top elected Republicans had been notably quiet about Paxton this week. But on Saturday both Trump and US Sen. Ted Cruz came to his defence, with the senator calling the impeachment process "a travesty" and saying the attorney general's legal troubles should be left to the courts.

"Free Ken Paxton," Trump wrote on his social media platform Truth Social, warning that if House Republicans proceeded with the process, "I will fight you." Abbott, who lauded Paxton while swearing him in for a third term in January, has remained silent. The governor spoke at a Memorial Day service in the House chamber about three hours before the impeachment proceedings began. Republican House Speaker Dade Phelan also attended but the two appeared to exchange few words, and Abbott left without commenting to reporters.

Asylum-seekers say joy over end of Title 42 turns to anguish

The day that President Joe Biden's administration ended a public health measure blocking many asylum-seekers at the Mexican border during the Coronavirus pandemic, Teodoso Vargas was ready to show US officials his scars and photos of his bulletriddled body.

Instead, he stood frozen with his pregnant wife and 5-year-old son at a Tijuana crossing, feet from US soil. He was unsure of the new rules rolled out with the change and whether taking the next few steps to approach US officials to ask for asylum in person could force a return to his native Honduras.

"I can't go back to my country," said Vargas, a long scar snaking down his neck from surgery after being shot nine times in his homeland during a robbery. "Fear is why I don't want to return. If I can just show the proof I have, I believe the US will let me in."

Asylum-seekers say joy over the end of the public health restriction known as Title 42 this month is turning into anguish with the uncertainty about how the Biden administration's new rules affect them.

Though the government opened some new avenues for immigration, the fate of many people is largely left to a US government app only used for scheduling an appointment at a port of entry and unable to

decipher human suffering or weigh the vulnerability of applicants.

The CBP One app is a key tool in creating a more efficient and orderly system at the border "while cutting out unscrupulous smugglers who profit from vulnerable migrants," the Department of Homeland Security said in an email to The Associated Press.

But since its rollout in January, the app has been criticised for technological problems. Demand has far outstripped the roughly 1,000 appointments available on the app each day. As a Honduran man, Vargas does not qualify for many of the legal pathways the Biden administration has introduced. One programme gives up to 30,000 Cubans, Haitians, Nicaraguans and Venezuelans a month a shot at humanitarian parole if they apply online, have a financial sponsor in the US and arrive by air. Minors traveling alone also are exempt from the rules.

Migrants who do not follow the rules, the government has said, could be deported back to their homelands and barred from seeking asylum for five years.

Vargas said he decided not to risk it. He has been logging onto the app each day at 9am for the past three months from his rented room in a crime-riddled Tijuana neighbourhood.

His experience is shared by tens of thousands of other asylumseekers in Mexican border towns.

US Army Air Force pilot killed during WWII accounted for

AP — HARRISBURG: An Army Air Force pilot from Pennsylvania killed during World War II has been accounted for almost eight decades later, military authorities said.

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency said last week that 2nd Lt. James Litherland, 25, of South Williamsport was accounted for in March.

In February 1944, Litherland was copiloting a B-17F Flying Fortress that was struck by anti-aircraft fire after a bombing raid on a German V-2 rocket site in Bois-Coquerel, France. Three airmen parachuted to safety but Litherland and six other crew members were still on board when the plane crashed near Le Translay, France, authorities said.

Six sets of remains were recovered near the crash site but only five were identified. In 2018, more material was recovered from the crash site and the unknown remains were exhumed from a cemetery in France.



Planet-friendly farming takes root in drought-hit Tunisia

aber Zouani lost his job as a waiter when the Covid pandemic ravaged the Tunisian tourism sector, so he decided to try something new and started a permac-

Now he grows all the food he needs and has become a pioneer of the style of ecological agriculture that is gaining fans worldwide, including in his North African country.

Many hope it will help Tunisia weather the impacts of climate change and wean it off its reliance on global supply chains, including grain and fertiliser imports from war-torn Ukraine and

In his western home town of Cap Negro, Zouani, 37, proudly showed off his three-hectare (seven-acre) farm, set up to mimic natural ecosystems in line with ideas popularised in the 1970s by Australian ecologists.

Permaculture, as an alternative to industrial agriculture, aims to work in harmony with the environment, keep soil structures intact, and do without artificial inputs such as chemical fertilisers or

pesticides. "No, these are not

weeds," said Zouani, a biotechnology graduate, pointing to nettles and dandelions growing wild all around his rows of onions, peppers and radishes.

When he harvests his vegetables, he said, he puts the excess green matter back onto the soil to slow evaporation — hoping to keep the ground as moist as a forest floor covered with fallen leaves.

Such methods are especially useful in Tunisia where an unprecedented drought has parched the countryside and left water reservoirs at dangerously low levels this spring.

At his farm, Zouani captures precious rainwater in a pond and only sparingly waters his plants, which are all grown from his own seeds.

Zouani also keeps cows, sheep, goats and chickens and composts their droppings to create soil enriched with the nitrogen-rich

natural fertiliser.

"We need to create living soil, attract earthworms, fungi and all the nutrients for our plants and trees," said Zouani.

Permaculture, he draws on farming methods and wisdoms of centuries past -- "returning to our roots, to the traditional methods used by our grandparents".

Zouani said he earns around 300 dinars (\$100) a month from selling farm produce, with enough left over to make him, his brother and their elderly parents self-sufficient.

In two or three years, he hopes to make "a decent income" and turn his farm, named "Om Hnia" in honour of his late grandmother, into an eatery and eventually a rural eco-lodge.

Zouani started off more than two years ago with the help of the Tunisian Association of Permaculture, which gave him initial training and then financial support for basic equipment.


The group's "Plant Your Farm" project aims to create 50 micro-farms over five years, of which around 30 are already up and running,

said its president Rim Mathlouthi.

The goal, Mathlouthi said, is to "demonstrate to the authorities and other farmers that permaculture is a profitable and efficient agricultural system which brings back biodiversity when the soil is depleted from ploughing and chemical inputs".

She said the initiative, with funding from Switzerland and others, even covers Tunisia's sun-baked arid regions and aims to entice jobless young people to cultivate abandoned family land.

TikTok is testing Al chatbot named Tako

¬ikTok is the latest app to jump on the generative artificial intelligence bandwagon. The social networking service is testing out a chatbot named Tako, which can answer questions and have conversations with users of the app, according to screenshots seen by Bloomberg. When asked about the feature, a representative said it was trying "new ways to power search and discovery on TikTok" in select markets.

We're always exploring new technologies that add value to our community," the spokesperson said in a statement. "We look forward to learning from our community as we continue to create a safe place that entertains, inspires creativity and drives culture." TikTok follows tech peers such as Snap, Microsoft and Google in developing chatbots and other generative AI tools - the buzziest technology to sweep the internet in recent years. The Tako test is currently available to a small number of employees, according to Daniel Buchuk, an analyst at Watchful, a company that tracks apps' development testing for competitors.

TikTok, owned by China's ByteDance, is making the push into AI at a contentious time. Policymakers in the US and Europe are looking to crack down on the app, fearing that data could be used by the Chinese government. This month, Montana became the first US state to approve a measure banning TikTok - legislation that faces legal challenges. For now, Tako appears as a small ghost-like icon on the top right of the app's screen. After tapping that icon, users are taken to an instant messenger, where they can ask questions.
