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


Amir, US Secretary of State discuss strategic relations

DOHA: Amir H H Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani met yesterday at his Amiri Diwan office with Secretary of State of the United States of America H E Marco Rubio and the accompanying delegation, on the occasion of his visit to the country.

During the meeting, they discussed strategic relations between the two countries and ways to enhance them, particularly in the defense field. They also discussed the most prominent regional and international developments of common concern, most notably the repercussions of the treacherous Israeli attack on Doha, in addition to the future of joint diplomatic efforts to reach a ceasefire in the Gaza Strip, release of hostages and prisoners, and de-escalation in the region.

Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs HE Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim Al-Thani attended the meeting. $-\mathit{QNA}$



'Gaza mediation process does not appear realistic at the moment'

DOHA: Advisor to the Prime Minister and Official Spokesperson for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Dr. Majed bin Mohammed Al Ansari has said that Qatar's mediation process for ceasefire in Gaza does not appear realistic at the moment.

"The process does not appear realistic at the moment especially as the Israeli Prime Minister is seeking to undermine negotiators and bomb the mediating country," he said yesterday in weekly media briefing.

Al Ansari said taht Qatar is currently fully focused on defending its national sovereignty and responding to the treacherous Israeli attack and on taking all necessary measures to prevent recurrence and hold those responsible accountable.

"All other political considerations are secondary to the current situation," he said. He

further said that Qatar understands the United States' appreciation for its role in mediation and welcomed the broad cooperation between the two countries, not only regarding Gaza but on a global level.

Al Ansari said that the Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit hosted in Doha on Monday to discuss the Israeli aggression on Qatar was a clear indication of a steadfast Arab-Islamic message and solidarity with Qatar.

"The summit in Doha conveyed a clear message that any aggression against Qatar is unacceptable to the Arab and Islamic nations."

He added, "The statement issued by the Supreme Council of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) during its extraordinary session also outlined clear measures to respond to the aggression. This message of solidarity was significant and resonated internationally, not just in Qatar or the Arab and Islamic

world, but globally."

To a question about Qatar-US defence agreement during visit of US Secretary of State Marco Rubio to Doha, he said that the matter has been under discussion between the two countries for a long time and is currently in preparation. "The defense relationship between Qatar and the United States has always been strong, especially in recent years, and continues to grow, representing another chapter of bilateral cooperation.

I do not have technical details regarding the potential defense agreement."

He confirmed that Qatar remains actively engaged in finalizing the defense agreement, which was also part of the discussions during US Secretary of State Rubio's visit to Doha yesterday (Tuesday).

Regarding recent comments by US President Donald Trump, Dr. Al Ansari said this was not the first time such positions were made clear, citing also a call between Trump and H H the Amir after the Israeli attack on Qatar. "It is a clear message to everyone that the US position on the aggression against Qatar—a strategic ally—is well understood. Certainly, communications on this issue are ongoing."

Responding to a question on Israeli Prime Minister's comments regarding attack on Doha, he said, "We are used to the Israeli Prime Minister trying to justify his failures with reckless rhetoric. His message reflects yet another such attempt."

'We also have a message for him: violating international law with impunity will not continue. Targeting a country that is actively mediating is a clear indication that he disrespects international norms and peace efforts. He shows no priority even in recovering his own hostages in Gaza. His message was clearly rejected by the international communitythrough the UN Security Council and through the Arab-Islamic summit in Doha yesterday."

He also told the media that in cooperation with Jordan, Qatar had sent 24 trucks loaded with food and medicine to Syria via Qatar Charity and the Qatar Fund for Development. "A tenth Qatari Air Force plane arrived in Kabul, Afghanistan, carrying urgent medical aid to support health facilities after a recent earthquake."

Israel has committed genocide in Gaza Strip, UN Commission finds

DOHA: Israel has committed genocide against Palestinians in the Gaza Strip, the UN Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and Israel said in a new report yesterday.

The Commission has urged Israel and all States to fulfill their legal obligations under international law to end the genocide and punish those responsible for it.

The Commission has been investigating the events on and since 7 October 2023 for the last two years, and concluded that Israeli authorities and Israeli security forces committed four of the five genocidal acts defined by the 1948 Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide, namely killing, causing serious bodily or mental harm, deliberately inflicting conditions of life calculated to bring about the destruction of the Palestinians in whole or in part, and imposing measures intended to prevent

Explicit statements by Israeli civilian and military authorities and the pattern of conduct of the Israeli security forces indicate that the genocidal acts were committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, Palestinians in the Gaza Strip as a group.

"The Commission finds that Israel is responsible for the commission of genocide in Gaza," said Navi Pillay, Chair of the Commission. "It is clear The Commission found that Israel is responsible for the commission of genocide in Gaza. It is clear that there is an intent to destroy the Palestinians in Gaza through acts that meet the criteria set forth in the Genocide Convention.

"The responsibility for these atrocity crimes lies with Israeli authorities at the highest echelons who have orchestrated a genocidal campaign for almost two years now with the specific intent to destroy the Palestinian group in Gaza," Pillay said. "The Commission also finds that Israel has failed to prevent and punish the commission of genocide, through failure to investigate genocidal acts and to prosecute alleged

perpetrators.' The report is based on all the Commission's prior investigations, as well as factual and legal findings in relation to attacks in Gaza carried out by Israeli forces, and the conduct and statements of Israeli authorities from 7 October 2023 until 31 July 2025. The Commission's findings are based on a comprehensive examination of the underlying acts of genocide (actus reus) and genocidal intent (dolus specialis). → P5

Qatar reiterates condemnation of Israeli attack, urges accountability at UNHRC emergency session

GENEVA: The State of Qatar participated yesterday in an emergency session within the 60th United Nations Human Rights Council (HRC60), regarding the treacherous Israeli assault that targeted Doha.

The Qatari delegation to the session was headed by Minister of State for International Cooperation H E Dr Maryam bint Ali bin Nasser Al Misnad.

In Qatar's statement during the session - joined by over 75 countries - she extended

genuine thanks to the Human Rights Council for its swift response in convening this emergency session. She noted that scu a response reflects the Council's pivotal role in safeguarding human rights and promoting international peace and security.

She also praised the positions of member states that supported the convening of this session during this critical time.

Al Misnad stated that the September 9 attack targeted a

densely populated civilian area in the heart of the capital, Doha, near diplomatic missions, schools, kindergartens, and mosques - an area home to about five thousand people, including Qatari families as well as families of residents, children, and women, she added.

She explained that this attack resulted in martyrs and injuries, including the martyr Corporal Badr Saad Al-Dosari, 22, and 18 wounded. This is not

only a blatant violation of the sovereignty of the State of Qatar and the integrity of its territory, but also a grave breach of fundamental human rights, the right to life, security, and the protection of children and education, as enshrined in international covenants, primarily the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, and the Convention on the Rights of the Child. — *QNA* → **P2**

16 countries express concern on Global Sumud Flotilla safety

DOHA: Foreign ministers from Qatar, Bangladesh, Brazil, Colombia, Indonesia, Ireland, Libya, Malaysia, the Maldives, Mexico, Pakistan, Oman, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain, and Turkiye have expressed their concern over the safety of the "Global Sumud Flotilla," a civil society initiative involving citizens from various countries

In a joint statement, the ministers noted

that the "Global Sumud Flotilla" aims to deliver humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip, raise awareness of the urgent humanitarian needs of the Palestinian people, and call for an end to the war in Gaza. The governments of these countries share these objectives – peace and the provision of humanitarian assistance – while reaffirming their commitment to upholding international law, including international humanitarian law.

The ministers further called on all parties to refrain from any illegal or violent actions against the fleet and to respect international law and humanitarian law.

They also reminded that any violation of international law or human rights involving participants in the fleet, including attacks on vessels in international waters or illegal detention, will result in accountability. — *QNA*

Kuwait Cabinet lauds GCC Supreme Council statement on Israeli aggression

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti Cabinet yesterday commended the GCC Supreme Council's final statement issued on Monday following an extraordinary session, in response to Israel's September 9 assault on the State of Oatar.

The extraordinary session convened in Doha to discuss the repercussions of the blatant violation of Qatar's sovereignty,

which targeted residential facilities housing members of Hamas' negotiating delegation amid mediation endeavours led by Doha to reach an agreement on Gaza.

The Supreme Council strongly condemned the aggression, condemning the hostile act as a dangerous and unacceptable escalation and a grave breach of the principles

of international law and the Charter of the United Nations.

The Council also reaffirmed GCC member states' full solidarity with the State of Qatar in all measures it takes to confront this aggression, stressing that the security of GCC states is indivisible and that any aggression against one of them is considered an aggression against all, in accordance with

the GCC Charter and the Joint Defense Agreement.

The Council affirmed the GCC states' readiness to support the State of Qatar and protect its security, stability, and sovereignty against any threats. The GCC leaders also directed the GCC Joint Defense Council to convene an urgent meeting in Doha, preceded by a Supreme Military Committee meeting to

assess the defensive posture of GCC states and sources of threat, in light of the Israeli aggression against the State of

The Unified Military Command was tasked with taking the necessary executive measures to activate joint defense mechanisms and Gulf deterrence capabilities.

Arab Human Rights Network urges action after Israeli attack on Qatar

DOHA: The General Assembly of the Arab Network for National Human Rights Institutions has called for urgent political and legal measures in response to the recent Israeli airstrike on Qatar, describing it as a serious violation of international law and human rights.

In an emergency meeting held yesterday in Doha — convened by Qatar's National Human Rights Committee (NHRC) — the assembly recommended supporting the outcomes of the Arab-Islamic Summit held in Doha on Monday, particularly the call to suspend Israel's UN membership under Article 5 of the

The network also urged the activation of political and diplomatic pressure to halt Israeli violations, accelerate international accountability processes, and expand legal efforts to include the attack on Qatari territory.

The statement voiced strong support for the independence of international

courts and stressed the need to protect judges and legal professionals from political pressure and global bullying.

NHRC Chairperson H E Maryam bint Abdullah Al Attiyah condemned the Israeli strike in her opening remarks, describing the attack as a deliberate assault on densely populated areas, including schools, kindergartens, diplomatic missions, and other civilian facilities in Doha.

This brutal aggression resulted in severe human rights violations, most notably the killing of six civilians, including a member of the internal security force who died while performing a public duty, she said.

Her excellency added that many others, including police officers and civilians, sustained injuries-some in critical condition.

Al Attivah added that the NHRC had documented all violations and highlighted the psychological toll on the

civilian population, particularly children, women, and vulnerable groups. She noted a worsening of health conditions for patients with chronic illnesses such as heart disease, hypertension, and diabetes, exacerbated by fear and trauma.

The attack also temporarily disrupted access to education for over 1,000 students, as several schools were damaged and families were gripped by fear, further affecting children's mental wellbeing and right to education.

The emergency session was described as a collective response by Arab human rights institutions to a clear breach of international law and an attack on Qatar's sovereignty and stability.

Al Attiyah emphasized that the meeting reflects a shared commitment to human rights and accountability, especially amid the ongoing failure of the international community to take decisive action against Israel's repeated violations and culture of impunity. -QNA

Arab Parliament welcomes outcomes of Doha summit

CAIRO: The Arab Parliament welcomed the outcomes of the Arab-Islamic Emergency Summit, held in Doha.

The Arab Parliament affirmed that the summit reflected the unity of the Arab and Islamic ranks in confronting the arrogance of the Israeli entity.

In a statement, President of the Arab Parliament Mohamed bin Ahmed Al Yamahi praised the summit's outcomes, saying that they embodied a unified Arab and Islamic stance against the brutal aggression carried out by the occupying entity against Qatar, as well as a rejection of the ongoing genocide committed against the Palestinian people for the past two years. -QNA

Göksu pointed out that President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan emphasised that "in the face of this attack, which constitutes a clear violation of international law and of Qatar's sovereignty, Türkiye stands with all its capabilities alongside

its Palestinian brothers and its strategic partner and ally, the brotherly State of Qatar. This attack demonstrates Israel's intention to deepen instability in the region."

Göksu added: "I would like to reiterate what our President has stressed: Those who have turned terrorism into state policy will never achieve their goals." He further noted that Türkiye will continue its firm and resolute stance against Israel's brazen attacks that aim to drag the region into catastrophe. "Regardless of the cost, we will persist in defending peace, international law, and the freedom of our Palestinian brothers."

Concluding his statement, the Ambassador underlined that Türkiye considers Qatar's security an integral part of its own national security and will not hesitate to support Doha politically and diplomatically in international forums. He said: "This attack will not deter our two countries from upholding truth and justice, nor will it succeed in destabilising the region or breaking the will of its peoples."

The Minister stressed that this attack constitutes a flagrant violation of international humanitarian law by targeting a purely civilian area, and represents an assault on a fullyfledged member state of the United Nations, amounting to state terrorism and posing a direct threat to regional and international peace and security.

She added that what makes the crime even more dangerous is that it targeted a state playing a mediating role in coordination with the United States and the Arab Republic of Egypt

to reach a ceasefire in Gaza. Targeting the mediating state is an attack on the principle of negotiation itself and a deliberate sabotage of peace efforts.

Al Misnad explained that Qatari mediation had previously contributed to tangible results, including the safe release of 135 hostages, which restored reassurance to hundreds of Israeli families.

Qatar also played a prominent role in achieving the truce agreement that gave civilians in Gaza a chance to breathe, and the humanitarian mediation allowed the entry of food aid for children suffering from

starvation and bombardment, deprived of their most basic

Al Misnad noted that these experiences confirm that Qatari mediation was never a symbolic act, but a genuine practice that saved lives, restored rights, and instilled hope in the possibility of reaching peaceful solutions to conflicts. Therefore, targeting the mediating state not only undermines the negotiation process but also diminishes the chances of saving more lives and achieving

The Minister stated that this attack was not an isolated

incident, but part of a broader campaign aimed at distorting Qatar's role and obstructing its diplomatic efforts. This was confirmed by statements from Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who clearly announced continued threats to other countries, in a dangerous escalation that threatens to drag the region and the world into systematic violations of international law. She pointed out that what happened in Doha could be repeated in any other capital if the international community does not act responsibly.

Regarding the Arab, Islamic,

and international stance through the Security Council meeting, she referred to the Emergency Arab-Islamic summit held in Doha, which unanimously condemned the brutal aggression and rejected any attempt to justify it.

UK slams Israeli attack on Qatar in UNHCR emergency session

GENEVA: The United Kingdom condemned the Israeli strike on September 9 that targeted residential compounds housing several Hamas leaders in Doha, and expressed full solidarity with the State of Qatar.

Speaking at the UN Human Rights Council's emergency session in Geneva on the Israeli attack, UK's Permanent Representative to the WTO and the United Nations in Geneva Kumar Iyer said that the UK strongly denounces the Israeli airstrikes on Doha, stands firmly in solidarity with Qatar, and extends condolences to the family of the Qatari security officer who was killed as well as sympathy to the families of the injured.

He said the attacks pose a serious threat to ongoing mediation efforts in Gaza and risk further escalation in the region.

Iyer also affirmed the United Kingdom's strong support for the efforts led by Qatar, the United States, and Egypt to secure a ceasefire in Gaza, facilitate the release of hostages, and bring an end to the war, stressing that all parties must continue working purposefully toward a negotiated agreement.

He added that the airstrikes on Qatar were unacceptable and would do nothing to advance peace in the Middle East, urging a political resolution as the only path to lasting peace and security for both Palestinians Israelis. — *QNA*

Israeli attack on **Qatar flagrant** violation of Arab sovereignty: Sudan



DOHA: Chairman of Sudan's Transitional Sovereignty Council, H E Lt. Gen. Abdel Fattah Al Burhan, has affirmed full solidarity with Qatar over the blatant Israeli attack, labelling it as a flagrant violation of sovereignty, international law and the UN charters.

In his speech at the emergency Arab-Islamic Summit in Doha on Monday, Al Burhan noted that it undermines sincere efforts aimed at reaching a settlement that ends the humanitarian tragedy in Gaza and weakens the chances of success of any efforts to achieve calm.

He stressed that the only way to achieve a just and lasting peace in the Middle East is through the establishment of an independent Palestinian state, appreciating the honourable positions taken by Qatar in support of just causes, foremost among them the Palestinian cause, and its humanitarian and political support for the Palestinian people. — *QNA*

Tajik President: Israeli aggression a flagrant breach of UN charter

DOHA: President of the Republic of Tajikistan H E Emomali Rahmon affirmed that the Israeli aggression against the State of Qatar constitutes a flagrant violation of international law and the fundamental principles of the United Nations Charter.

In his address at the Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit held in Doha on Monday, H E President Rahmon described the attack on the State of Oatar as deplorable, stressing that it represented an assault on the sovereignty and territorial integrity of the country.

It stood out as a defining moment, showing that even in the face of mounting challenges, nations can find common ground and speak with one voice, Ambassador of Kazakhstan to Qatar H E Arman Issagaliyev told *The*

global politics, seeing countries come together in solidarity is not just encouraging - it is essential for safeguarding justice, sovereignty, and peace.

"The discussions on September 15 carried exceptional weight. Delegates did not limit themselves to abstract principles; the voices raised in Doha expressed shared resolve and collective responsibility. The summit sent a clear message that the use of force cannot be accepted, that sovereignty is inviolable, and that humanitarian considerations must guide decisions above all else. From Kazakhstan's perspective, the event demonstrated that the countries of the region have both the moral authority and political will to act as a stabilizing force on the global stage," Ambassador Issagaliyev said.

"Equally striking was the spirit of brotherhood and cooperation that permeated the discussions. It was not rhetoric but genuine solidarity, rooted in shared values and historical ties. Kazakhstan sees this as a foundation for long-term collaboration — ranging from humanitarian support to mediation efforts, and even the collective defence of international law. The outcomes of the summit confirm that when united, external pressures cannot erode our principles," he added.

"The gravity of the circumstances that prompted the meeting cannot be ignored. The escalation in the Middle

East, particularly the strikes against the State of Qatar, represents a clear violation of sovereignty and the norms of international law. No pretext can justify them; they threaten not only Qatar but the principle of sovereign equality among all nations," the Kazakh envoy elaborated,

Kazakhstan has consistently called for a ceasefire and unhindered humanitarian access he said."We have provided financial and material support, including through the Organization for Food Security in Astana, and we urge all the OIC member states to expand assistance to the Palestinian people. The two-state solution endorsed by the UN Security Council remains the only viable path to lasting peace," Ambassador Issagaliyev said.

"Looking back at the summit of September 15, one message is unmistakable: it reaffirmed that countries of the region can stand firm, uphold their values, and contribute to a fairer international order. Kazakhstan is proud to be part of this collective voice for peace, justice, and sustainable development," he concluded.

Kuwait reiterates condemnation of Israeli aggression against Qatar

GENEVA: The State of Kuwait reiterated its strong condemnation and denunciation of the brutal and cowardly Israeli aggression that targeted residential headquarters of several Hamas leaders in Doha on September 9.

This came in Kuwait's statement Tuesday before the United Nations Human Rights Council (HRC) during the emergency session dedicated to discussing the Israeli aggression against Qatar, which was called for by the State of Kuwait on behalf of the Gulf Cooperation Council countries, alongside Pakistan on behalf of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC), as part of the 60th session of the Council held in Geneva.

Kuwait emphasized that this treacherous aggression is a blatant violation of all international laws and norms, a serious threat to the region's security and stability, and a direct undermining of international peace and security.

The State of Kuwait affirmed its unwavering support for the State of Qatar in the measures it takes to preserve its security, stability, sovereignty, and the safety of its citizens and residents.

Kuwait also reiterated its position calling for the United Nations and the international community to assume their responsibilities in preserving international peace and security, and to take serious and effective steps to stop Israel's systematic aggression against countries in the region and to hold the perpetrators of these crimes against unarmed civilians accountable. -QNA

A total of 301 educators, including TFL Fellows, hotline teachers, and other local teachers, will be trained using the Education Above All Foundation's 'Let Kids Be Kids' SEL toolkit. This resource includes over 100 activity-based modules designed to promote emotional resilience, positive routines, and life skills through engaging, interactive methods.

Secretary-General of the League, Dr. Mohammed bin Abdulkarim Al Issa, praised the summit and its statement for embodying values of solidarity and unity in the face of Israeli aggression against Qatar, describing it as an attack on all Arab and Islamic countries. He emphasized the firm rejection of any attempts to justify this aggression under any pretext.

At the same time, Dr. Al Issa highlighted the summit's outcomes, which hold the Israeli government responsible for undermining any prospects for peace in the region through its aggressive policies, including genocide, ethnic cleansing, starvation, blockades, settlement activities, and its expansionist policies - leading up to the recent treacherous attack on Qatari territory. He noted Qatar's role as a key mediator in efforts to secure a ceasefire and end the war on Gaza, describing this as a dangerous escalation and an attack on diplomatic efforts to

Dr. Al Issa also stressed the importance of the statement's rejection of Israeli occupation rhetoric, which employs "Islamophobia" to legitimize its violations of international law and distort the image of Arab and Islamic countries.

He further commended the UN General Assembly's adoption of the "New York Declaration" regarding the implementation of the two-state solution and the establishment of an independent Palestinian state, viewing it as a clear expression of international support for the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people. – *QNA*

Qatar renews condemnation of Israeli attack, announces financial contribution to IAEA

VIENNA: Qatar has renewed its condemnation of the treacherous Israeli attack that targeted its territories on September 9, and considered it a flagrant violation to its sovereignty and security and a clear breach of the UN Charter and international law.

Minister of Environment and Climate Change H E Dr. Abdullah bin Abdulaziz bin Turki Al Subaie delivered a speech at the 69th General Conference of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), held in Vienna, Austria, during which Qatar affirmed that this aggression was met with widespread rejection from the international community and widespread solidarity with Doha, which

stressed that it would take all necessary measures to defend its sovereignty and territorial integrity and work with its partners to ensure that Israel is held accountable for the crime it has committed.

He announced that Qatar will make a financial contribution of \$600,000 to support the agency's resources for the period 2026-2027, expressing the country's appreciation for the agency's efforts to enhance nuclear security and develop the peaceful uses of nuclear technologies.

He also revealed that Qatar has submitted three new national projects within the cooperation cycle 2026-2027, in addition to participating in regional projects, most notably

the project to establish the largest secondary calibration laboratory of its kind in the region, with Qatari funding of EUR 2 million in cooperation with the agency.

The Minister stressed Qatar's firm position in supporting the nuclear non-proliferation regime and rejecting policies of force and threats of using nuclear weapons, calling for intensified efforts to establish a nuclear-weapon-free zone in the Middle East, given Israel's continued refusal to join the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty and subject its facilities to a comprehensive safeguards agreement.

He pointed out the seriousness of recent Israeli statements regarding the possible

use of nuclear weapons against the Palestinian people in Gaza, considering this a flagrant violation of international law and a direct threat to regional and international security.

He also noted that Qatar has made significant strides in responding to nuclear and radiological emergencies, commending IAEA's support for the country's efforts to develop nuclear safety and security strategies that ensure the protection of humans and the environment.

The Minister highlighted the Qatari scientific team's participation in the second International Nuclear Science Olympiad in Malaysia, pointing out that the team won three medals. — QNA

Indonesian FM: Israeli aggression against **Qatar a blatant violation of international law**

DOHA: Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia H E Sugiono affirmed that the aggression against Doha is unacceptable, as it represents a blatant violation of international law, the Charter of the United Nations, as well as the principles of the Charter of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation.

The MoPH has urged citizens and residents, especially those belonging to the groups mentioned above, to take the seasonal influenza vaccine as early as possible. The Ministry also encourages all community members to get vaccinated, given its key role in safeguarding public health and limiting the spread of infection.

The influenza vaccine is available free of charge at all PHCC Centres, as well as at healthcare facilities affiliated with the Ministries of Interior and Defence, Qatar Energy, all private hospitals, and more than fifty private healthcare facilities across the State of


The visit reaffirmed the Award's position as a leading global platform for building bridges between cultures and underscored Qatar's role in promoting dialogue and international understanding through translation.

We are confident that the upcoming tour to China, with its rich academic and cultural programme, will open new horizons for dialogue and further enhance Qatar's cultural presence on the international stage."

Azerbaijan affirms support for Qatar, lauds its mediation efforts

DOHA: Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Azerbaijan H E Jeyhun Bayramov, described the Israeli attack on the State of Qatar as a brutal assault and a serious threat that will exacerbate the situation in the Gaza Strip and deepen the humanitarian tragedy there.

In his speech at the Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit in Doha Monday, he affirmed his country's full support for the State of Qatar in confronting the aggression, praising Doha's mediation efforts to end the aggression on Gaza and reach a peaceful settlement to the crisis. He also called for respect for the UN Charter and called for an end to the war in Gaza through dialogue and the adoption of necessary measures to avoid undermining security in the region.

He said that all concerned parties must make efforts to reach an immediate ceasefire, promote dialogue, and de-escalate the situation.

He stressed the need to seek a peaceful settlement of the Palestinian issue based on a two-state solution, in accordance with international law and relevant UN resolutions, calling for respect for the fundamental rights of the Palestinian people. — *QNA*

Israel has committed genocide in Gaza Strip, UN Commission finds

In establishing the genocidal acts, the Commission examined the Israeli military operations in Gaza, including killing and seriously harming unprecedented numbers of Palestinians; imposing a total siege, including blocking humanitarian aid leading to starvation; systematically destroying the healthcare and education systems in Gaza; committing systematic acts of sexual and gender based violence; directly targeting children; carrying out systematic and widespread attacks on religious and cultural sites; and disregarding the orders of the International Court of Justice.

In establishing genocidal intent, the Commission applied the 'only reasonable inference' standard set forth by the International Court of Justice in the case of Bosnia v. Serbia. The Commission analysed statements made by Israeli authorities and concluded that those statements are direct evidence of genocidal intent. The Commission also analysed the pattern of conduct of Israeli authorities and the Israeli security forces in Gaza, including imposing starvation and inhumane conditions of life for Palestinians in

Gaza, and found that genocidal intent was the only reasonable inference that could be concluded from the nature of their operations.

"Israel has flagrantly disregarded the orders for provisional measures from the International Court of Justice and warnings from Member States, UN offices, human rights organisations and civil society groups, and continued the strategy of destruction of the Palestinians in $Gaza, "said\ Pillay.\ "The\ Commission$ finds that the Israeli authorities had no intention to change their course of actions. On the contrary, Israeli authorities have persisted and continued with their genocidal campaign in Gaza for almost two years now. Israel must immediately end the genocide in Gaza and comply fully with the orders for provisional measures of the International Court of Justice."

The acts of Israeli political and military leaders are attributable to the State of Israel. The Commission therefore concluded that the State of Israel bears responsibility for the failure to prevent genocide, the commission of genocide and the failure to punish the perpetrators of genocide against the Palestinians in

the Gaza Strip. The Commission also concluded that Israeli President Isaac Herzog, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and then Defence Minister Yoav Gallant, have incited the commission of genocide and that Israeli authorities have failed to take action against them to punish this incitement. The Commission has not fully assessed statements by other Israeli political and military leaders and considers that they too should be assessed to determine whether they constitute incitement to commit genocide.

The Commission urges the Government of Israel to comply immediately with its international legal obligations, including to end the genocide in the Gaza Strip and fully implement the provisional measures orders of the International Court of Justice.

Israel must end its policy of starvation, lift the siege and facilitate and ensure the unimpeded access of humanitarian aid at scale and unhindered access of all United Nations staff, including UNRWA and OHCHR international staff, and all recognised international humanitarian agencies delivering and coordinating aid. The Commission calls

on Israel to immediately end the activities of the Gaza Humanitarian

Foundation. The Commission recommended that Member States cease the transfer of arms and other equipment that may be used for the commission of genocidal acts to Israel; ensure individuals and corporations in their territories and within their jurisdiction are not involved in aiding and assisting the commission of genocide or incitement to commit genocide; and take action on accountability through investigations and legal proceedings against individuals or corporations that are involved in the genocide directly or indirectly.

"The international community cannot stay silent on the genocidal campaign launched by Israel against the Palestinian people in Gaza. When clear signs and evidence of genocide emerge, the absence of action to stop it amounts to complicity," said Pillay. "Every day of inaction costs lives and erodes the credibility of the international community. All States are under a legal obligation to use all means that are reasonably available to them to stop the genocide in Gaza."

Broad international, UN solidarity with Qatar at HRC debate

GENEVA: United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights H E Volker Turk condemned the military attack launched by Israel on the State of Qatar on September 9, affirming that targeting Qatar represents a shocking breach of international law, an assault on regional peace and stability, and a blow to the integrity of mediation and negotiation efforts around the world.

This condemnation came during the emergency debate held Tuesday in Geneva by the Human Rights Council (HRC60) in its 60th session to discuss the serious developments resulting from the Israeli attack on Doha.

Volker Turk stated that targeting parties engaged in internationally supported mediation on their own soil undermines Qatar's central role as a mediator and facilitator of peace, and civilians not directly involved in hostilities must never be targeted.

He added that when states disregard the rules of war, they undermine the protection of all civilians everywhere, stressing that the Israeli attack on Doha coincided with other actions that destroy any hope for a two-state solution, the only path to sustainable peace.

He pointed to the displacement order of nearly one million people from Gaza City as part of a new phase of the Israeli assault on the Strip, highlighting that the Hamas delegation was present in Qatar to negotiate a ceasefire, which he described as a vital step toward peace. — *QNA*

President of Supreme Judiciary Council, Syrian Justice Minister review digital transformation

DOHA: President of the Supreme Judiciary Council and President of the Court of Cassation H E Dr. Hassan bin Lahdan Al Hassan Al Mohannadi met with Minister of Justice of the Syrian Arab Republic H E Dr. Mazhar Abdul Rahman Al Wais and his accompanying delegation, who are on a visit to the State of Qatar.

The Syrian Minister of Justice's visit to the Supreme Judiciary Council was intended to review the experience of digital transformation for the judiciary system, as well as the commercial judiciary with respect to investment disputes. He met

with President of the Investment and Trade Court H E Judge Khalid bin Ali Al Obaidli, and toured the court's halls, where he reviewed the effective operation mechanisms the court pursues, along with its critical role in creating a judicial environment conducive to investment.

At the premises of the Court of Appeal and Cassation, Dr. Al Wais was briefed on the experience of the constant digital transformation journey to bolster justice systems, through a presentation that pitched the key steps the Supreme Judiciary Council

takes to accelerate the judicial proceedings and ensure swift and effective justice.

The presentation was delivered by H E Judge Khaled Al Mansoori, a Vice-President at the Court of Appeal, with President of the Court of Appeal, H E Judge Sultan Matar Al Dosari, in attendance.

Upon wrapping up the visit, both sides underscored the depth of relations between the State of Qatar and the Syrian Arab Republic, along with the outcome of this visit in terms of a joint commitment to forging both legal and judiciary cooperation and sharing expertise. -QNA

Indivisible unity of Gulf states

SCORES of leaders and senior officials from Arab and Islamic countries gathered in Doha on Monday for the Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit, where they unanimously expressed their solidarity with Qatar and strongly condemned Israel's aggression. The leaders called for joint action to confront the escalating violations and safeguard regional stability.

On the sidelines of the summit, the Supreme Council of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) convened an extraordinary session under the chairmanship of the Amir, H H Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani. The Council reviewed the repercussions of the Israeli assault on Qatar, describing it as a blatant violation of its sovereignty and a direct attack on the collective efforts of the international community to secure a ceasefire in Gaza and facilitate the release of hostages and detainees.

The Council denounced the aggression in the strongest terms, labelling it a grave breach of international law and the UN Charter. It stressed that this act of hostility represents a dangerous escalation, undermining peace efforts and destabilising the region.

Reaffirming the indivisibility of Gulf security, the Supreme Council declared that any attack on one GCC member state is tantamount to an attack on all. Member states emphasised their readiness to mobilise all available resources to support Qatar and defend its sovereignty, stability, and security against threats. In this regard, the leaders instructed the GCC Joint Defence Council to hold an urgent meeting in Doha to assess the region's defence posture and directed the Unified Military Command to implement the necessary measures to activate joint defence mechanisms and deterrence capabilities.

The Council further affirmed that the assault on Qatar poses a direct threat not only to Gulf security but also to regional peace and stability. It warned that Israel's continued aggression risks derailing existing agreements and understandings, with farreaching consequences for the entire region.

The Supreme Council also issued a strong warning that Israel's persistence in criminal practices and its disregard for international law could have serious repercussions for global peace and security. It urged the UN Security Council, influential powers, and the wider international community to shoulder their responsibilities by taking decisive measures to halt these violations and impose effective international

The Council called on the international community to denounce the brutal assault on Qatar as well as the genocide unfolding in Gaza, where civilians face starvation and forced displacement. It underscored the urgent need for collective international action to stop these crimes and restore respect for international law.

As ties with U.S. fray, Indian sentiment turns sharply against America

AS diplomatic tensions between Washington and New Delhi spiked in recent months, a longburied mistrust of the United States has surged back to life in the world's most populous

For older Indians, the barrage of abrasive remarks from President Donald Trump and his allies has revived painful memories of past slights, analysts said; for younger generations, it has called into question a relationship many had come to take for granted. The harsh rhetoric from U.S. officials has dovetailed with escalating hate speech online targeting Indians and Indian Americans, according to researchers, hardening the divide.

In recent days, Trump and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi have signaled a possible reconciliation. The president said on Sept. 5 that the United States and India have a "special relationship" and that there is "nothing to worry about." On Tuesday, he announced that stalled trade talks would resume; Modi expressed confidence on X that the negotiations would unlock "the limitless potential of the India-US partnership." But real damage has already been done, according to analysts and former officials.

"Even if there is a mend in ties, this betrayal of trust will be remembered for a long time," said Milan Vaishnav, director of the South Asia program at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Anna Kelly, the White House deputy press secretary, said in a statement that Trump and Modi "have a respectful relationship" and that "the United States and India remain in close communication on the full range of diplomatic, defense and commercial priorities in our strategic partnership." The fallout began when

New Delhi publicly contradicted Trump's repeated claim that he brokered a ceasefire between India and Pakistan in May, after the most serious military confrontation between the nuclear archrivals in decades. In July, Trump began lashing out at India over its continued purchases of Russian oil and, last month, he penalized the country by ramping up tariffs to 50 percent.

On social media, Trump has dismissed India as a "dead economy" and mockingly suggested it may eventually have to buy oil from Pakistan. Trump adviser Peter Navarro has called the country a "Kremlin laundromat" and accused Modi of "getting in bed" with Chinese leader Xi Jinping and Russian President Vladimir Putin. Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick demanded that India "stop being a part of BRICS" - a bloc that includes Brazil, Russia, India, South Africa and China - viewed by many here as an attack on the country's strategic autonomy.

Despite a restrained response from Indian officials, observers say the public mood is undergoing a deep, perhaps generational, shift away from America.

"Historically, there has been a fair amount of skepticism about how much India should be aligned with the U.S.," said Navtej Sarna, a former Indian ambassador to Washington. "The newer generation has not felt that mistrust. Now, there is a new breach." The last time Indians were this angry with the United States was in the '90s, said Raja Mohan, director of the Institute of South Asian Studies at the National University of Singapore, when Washington sanctioned the country for carrying out nuclear tests. But the historical wounds run deeper.



Despite a restrained response from Indian officials, observers say the public mood is undergoing a deep, perhaps generational, shift away

from America.

Indian officials are still quick to bring up the U.S. backing of Pakistan during the 1971 war with India, including its dispatch of naval forces to the Bay of Bengal.

The 2008 nuclear agreement between the countries marked a breakthrough, said Shyam Saran, a former Indian foreign secretary who helped negotiate the deal, and the relationship began to

"The 25 years since have seen an upward curve irrespective of which government is in power here or in Washington," he said. After a border dispute between China in 2020, India drifted even closer to Washington.

Now, as the flare-up reawakens old suspicions, Modi's foreign policy will have to take popular sentiment into account, Saran said.

"The Americans have never and can never be trusted friends," said Sukesh Khajuria, a 65-yearold teacher in Jammu, in Indianadministered Kashmir. "They can ditch us at any time." "Commercial trade may go on," said 66-year-old Kalpana Gupta, a financial consultant on the outskirts of New Delhi, but "this feeling will linger." Srinath Bharadwaj, a 33-year-old project manager in Mumbai, said he has tried to stop using American products since the unraveling between Modi and Trump. "Somebody who is unable to take care of their own house is trying to win over the world," he said of the American president, adding he no longer plans to apply for a U.S. visa to visit family.

"A lot of their intellectual capital is built by Indians, and if they are unable to understand what we bring to the table, then they have no right to dictate how we should behave," Bharadwaj

A recent surge in online invective has deepened the rupture. In a forthcoming study, the Center for the Study of Organized Hate, based in Washington, documented a fivefold spike in anti-Indian posts on X in August as compared with July.

The most widely circulated posts, according to researchers, which were viewed tens of millions of times, called for deportations, referred to Indian immigrants as invaders and accused them of taking jobs from Americans.

"The United States is the epicenter of anti-Indian digital hostility, where immigration and job anxieties converge most forcefully," said Raqib Hameed Naik, the organization's executive director. The hostility has intensified during the diplomatic crisis, he said, adding "a geopolitical edge to existing grievances." The president's supporters have seen "Trump take India on," said Joyojeet Pal, a professor who studies social media at the University of Michigan, and "it emboldens them to say it isn't just their opinion but it is endorsed by the person whose opinion matters the most." Indian commentators have hit back online and on television. Navarro, the Trump adviser, was widely mocked last week when his posts about Indian tariffs and Russian oil purchases were contradicted by X's community notes feature, which he then blamed on "India's keyboard minions." "I'm starting to feel sorry for this old man," Shiv Aroor, the managing editor of NDTV, posted on X.

The language used by U.S. officials and parroted online is "deeply, deeply offensive here," said Saran, the former foreign secretary. "I don't think they realize that it conjures up all the very negative images of the White man and imperialist pretensions." After Trump's more reassuring words about the U.S.-India relationship, many here claimed victory. "India has stood firm in the face of all these threats and coercion," Ashok Sajjanhar, a former Indian diplomat, told India Today. Modi's "gracious diplomacy" has won out over "tantrum" diplomacy, said Shubhangi Sharma, news editor at Network18.

But even if the two leaders are able to patch things up and reach an agreement on trade policy, analysts said the bilateral relationship is unlikely to fully

"We are free from you all now," Indian Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said in a Sept. 5 interview in response to comments from Navarro. "We'll take care of ourselves.'

In Gaza City, death seems easier than displacement

IN Gaza, death seems easier than the endless suffering of displacement. Death ends pain; displacement only makes it worse, opening a wound that never heals.

In Gaza City, people face two bitter choices: stay and risk being killed or imprisoned, or flee southward to an impossible life in a camp. Displacement is not simply a relocation-it is a slow death. It is embarking on a journey not knowing whether there will be shelter, food, or water at the end. It means exhaustion, homelessness, and fear. Even reaching a shelter offers no real safety because death can still follow vou there.

Since the start of the war, my family and I have been displaced 15 times. Each time has been harder than the one before. Every time, we have lost our possessions, our health, our sense of security.

It all started in October 2023. We

fled our home in the Tal al-Hawa neighbourhood, which was subsequently bombed in November, and sought shelter at the nearby Al-Bahrain School. We stayed there until mid-November. From there, we went to my uncle's house in Tal al-Hawa and then to my aunt's house in the Zeitoun area. We then went to another uncle's house in Tal al-Hawa; when that area got too dangerous, we moved two streets away to another relative's home.

From there we moved to our neighbours' home and then to a basement. When a missile landed near us without exploding, we fled again to Al-Bahrain School. From there, we moved to my cousin's home in the Daraj area, but then it got dangerous, so we moved to the port area. We went back to my cousin's house and then finally to my grandfather's in the Daraj area. The situation became dangerous again, so we went to the port for a while and then again back to my grandfather's.

We stayed there for a while as the famine deepened. Starvation affected me deeply. Every time I saw food, it seemed to shrink in front of my eyes. I was afraid to eat a lot and would cry while eating because I was scared that one of us might die of hunger. I lost 10kg (22lbs) and became very weak. I was diagnosed with anaemia and vitamin deficiencies.

In July, we decided to sell the tent

we had used during displacement for \$140. We bought flour with the money.

When Israel declared it was going to attack Gaza City again, we fell into total despair. For my family - like many others - moving was impossible. We had no money for transport, no relatives in the south, and no tent.

So we decided to stay as others fled south.

Then on September 7, our home was bombed. Our neighbours received a phone call from the Israelis that the mosque next to our building would be bombed; we were given seven minutes to evacuate the area.

I grabbed some clothes and a desk lamp – a gift from a dear friend – put them in a bag, and ran outside with my siblings. Seven minutes passed, and nothing happened. My father ran back into the building to pick up a few more things and came out. He then went back again with my siblings to take a few more things. He went back a third time to take out some food. We screamed in panic, "Why did he go back? Why did he go back?" I broke down, crying and shouting, "My father!" Moments later, my father emerged, hugging the bag of flour. Yes, this is what a father is — the one who risks his life to secure bread for his family.

We thought we were all safe, but we weren't. Instead of bombing the mosque, the Israelis hit my grandfather's home. He was too close to the building and was martyred.

We are now once again homeless

and grieving the loss of a loved one.

We were forced to go to my aunt's house in an area that has also received evacuation orders and been threatened by the Israelis with bombing. We are staying there even though it is dangerous because we have nowhere to go.

Israel claims that the south is safe, but this is false. Every other day, we hear a story of Israeli drones bombarding the camps in al-Mawasi. Just a week ago, Israel bombed a tent belonging to a family just three hours after their arrival from northern Gaza; three members of the family were martyred.

We fear what Israel has planned for us. We have read the news reports about concentration camps being established in the south, resembling those set up by the Nazis.

Rumours have spread that people's names will be replaced with numbers; phones will be confiscated so there is no documentation; food will be rationed.

Displacement has stolen not only our homes and memories, but our very souls. Our faces are pale from hunger, grief, and fear.

I was once a merchant of hope, but now I beg for even a single word of it. I have endured starvation, thirst, missiles, and unbearable loss. I may not survive my 15th displacement. - Eman Murtaja is Journalism and

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Israel launches ground assault on Gaza City, UN slams it as 'carnage'

GAZA CITY: Israel launched its longanticipated ground offensive in Gaza City yesterday, prompting widespread international alarm, with the UN condemning it as "carnage".

A United Nations commission accused Israel of committing "genocide" in the Palestinian territory, saying Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and other senior officials had incited the crime.

The Israeli military unleashed a massive bombardment of Gaza City overnight as its troops moved deeper into the territory's largest urban hub.

UN chief Antonio Guterres said Israel was "determined to go up to the end". Israel was "not open to a serious negotiation for a ceasefire, with dramatic consequences from Israel's point of view", he said.

An AFP journalist saw many people, including children, sleeping in front of a hospital in Gaza City after fleeing their

Why kill children sleeping safely like that, turning them into body parts?" said Abu Abd Zaquout. "We pulled the children out in pieces."

The assault was "systematic ethnic cleansing targeting our people in Gaza", Hamas said in a statement.

Gaza's civil defence, a rescue force operating under Hamas authority, said at least 44 people had been killed by Israeli fire on Tuesday.

Media restrictions in the territory and difficulties in accessing many areas mean AFP is unable to independently verify the details provided by the civil defence or the Israeli military.

Yesterday, the UN Independent International Commission of Inquiry (COI) found that "genocide is occurring in Gaza and is continuing to occur",

commission chief Navi Pillay told AFP. The responsibility lies with the State of Israel."

The investigators said explicit statements by Israeli civilian and military authorities along with the pattern of Israeli forces' conduct "indicated that the genocidal acts were committed with intent to destroy... Palestinians in the Gaza Strip as a group".

The report concluded that Netanyahu, President Isaac Herzog and former defence minister Yoav Gallant have "incited the commission of genocide". UN rights chief Volker Turk told AFP and Reuters that: "It's for the court to decide whether it's genocide or not, and we see the evidence mounting."

He also condemned the assault on Gaza City, saying it was "absolutely clear that this carnage must stop"

UN says over 10,000 children with acute malnutrition in Gaza City

GENEVA: More than 10,000 children need treatment for acute malnutrition in Gaza City the United Nations Children's

Fund (Unicef) reported. 'The forced and massive displacement of families from Gaza City is a deadly threat to the most vulnerable," said Tess Ingram, a Unicef spokeswoman in southern Gaza's Al-Mawasi zone.

Speaking to journalists at a televised UN press briefing in Geneva, Ingram warned of worsening rates of child malnutrition.

"We estimate that 26,000 children in the Gaza Strip currently require treatment for acute malnutrition, including more than 10,000 in Gaza City alone," she said.

She explained that in

August, more than one in eight children examined in the Gaza Strip suffered from acute malnutrition, "the highest level ever recorded". In Gaza City, that figure was one in five.

Nutrition centres in Gaza City have been "forced to shut this week due to evacuation orders and the military escalation", Ingram added.

The Israeli army claims

those evacuating southward to the Al-Masawi area will find food, tents, and medicine.

However, nearly two years into the war, Israel has frequently bombed so-called "humanitarian zones" in the Gaza Strip, claiming to target Hamas fighters there.

"It is inhumane to expect nearly half a million children, battered and traumatised by

over 700 days of unrelenting conflict, to flee one hellscape to end up in another," Ingram noted.

Around 150,000 people have fled Gaza City to the south since August 14, Ingram said.

According to Unicef's team on the ground, people are still moving "inside and around" Gaza City, unable to seek refuge elsewhere. -AFP

India says trade talks with US 'positive'

MUMBAI: India said trade talks with the United States yesterday were "positive" and added that both countries had decided to "intensify efforts" to clinch a deal.

Indian and US trade officials held discussions in the capital New Delhi.

The US delegation included Brendan Lynch, assistant trade representative for South and Central Asia.

"Acknowledging the enduring importance of bilateral trade between India and the US, the discussions were positive and forward looking covering various aspects of the trade deal," an Indian commerce ministry statement said. "It was decided to intensify efforts to achieve early conclusion of a mutually beneficial Trade Agreement," the statement added. Despite being one of the first few countries to start trade negotiations with Washington, India has so far failed to secure a deal that would ease its tariff burden.

Exporters in the world's most populous country have already warned of cancelled orders and potentially significant job losses. -AFP

Landslides kill 12 in eastern Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR: At least 12 people were killed in landslides in Malaysia's Sabah state after heavy rains battered the Borneo island region for the past week, news reports said yesterday.

More than 2,000 people living in low-lying areas including around the capital Kota Kinabalu have been evacuated due to recent flooding, rescue authorities said. The worst incident happened on Monday, when debris hit an informal dwelling on the outskirts of the capital, killing eight people including four children, the New Straits Times reported.

Three others, including a 10-year-old girl were killed in another landslide at Gana, about 100 km east of Kota Kinabalu, also Monday, while a 97-year-old man was buried by mud at Penampang last week, outside the city Heavy downpours have hit Sabah on northeastern Borneo for the past 10 days, flooding low-lying areas, causing landslides and damage to homes and infrastructure in Malaysia's poorest state. -AFP

Syria unveils plan with Jordan, US to restore calm in Suwayda

DAMASCUS: Syrian forces have withdrawn heavy weapons from the country's south, a military official said yesterday, as Damascus announced a roadmap for restoring calm in a violence-hit southern

"Syrian forces have withdrawn their heavy weapons from southern Syria," the military official told AFP on condition of anonymity, adding the process began around two months ago after the violence.

A diplomatic source in Damascus told AFP, also on condition of anonymity, that the withdrawal covered the country's south up to about 10 kilometres (six miles) outside the capital.

After toppling of longtime Syrian ruler Bashar Al-Assad in December, Israel deployed troops to a UN-patrolled buffer zone on the Golan Heights that has separated the countries' forces since an armistice that followed the 1973 Arab-Israeli war. Israel has also repeatedly bombed Syria since Assad's fall.

Foreign Minister Asaad al-Shaibani announced vesterday a plan backed by Jordan and the United States to restore calm in the area. "The Syrian government has laid out a clear roadmap for action... that supports justice and builds trust," Shaibani said in a press conference, adding that the plan involves holding accountable those who attacked civilians, compensating the people affected and "launching a o f process internal reconciliation".

Jordanian Foreign Minister Ayman Safadi, present at the event with US envoy Tom Barrack, said a "joint Syrian-Jordanian-American mechanism" would ensure the plan's implementation.

Barrack said the steps taken by the Syrian government yesterday were "historic"

Earlier yesterday, Syrian authorities announced the creation of a new internal security chief position for Suwayda city, naming a member of the Druze community to the post.

The new chief, Suleiman Abdel Baqi, leads a local armed group that is seen favourably by the new authorities. The Syrian military official said security personnel in Suwayda would comprise people from the province. $-\hat{AFP}$

Malawi holds presidential, parliamentary vote

LILONGWE: Malawians voted yesterday in elections overshadowed by soaring prices and crippling fuel shortages, with the economic gloom a challenge to President Lazarus Chakwera's bid for a second

In a crowded field of 17 candidates, observers said Chakwera's closest rival was his predecessor, 85-year-old Peter Mutharika, a law professor who has spent decades living outside of the southern African nation, one of the poorest countries in the world.

While many mainly younger voters said they wanted change, others were willing to give Chakwera a second chance to fix an economy bogged down by inflation at above 27 percent and a chronic foreign exchange shortage that has forced limits on imports of fuel, fertiliser and food. Long queues formed at outdoor polling stations across the largely rural nation as polls opened but the election authority said that by early afternoon turnout was only 51 percent. -AFP

Israel strikes Houthi-held Yemeni port

HODEIDA: Israel struck Yemen's Huthi-held Hodeida port yesterday. The rebels' Al-Masirah television said "12 Israeli enemy air strikes targeted the port of Hodeida".

Military spokesman Yahya Saree said the group's air defences were "currently confronting Israeli enemy aircraft launching an aggression against our country".

On Wednesday, Israeli air strikes hit the Huthi armed forces' media operation in Sanaa and other targets in Jawf province, killing 46 people and wounding more than 160, according to the group. In August, Israeli air strikes near Sanaa killed Huthi prime minister Ahmed Ghaleb Nasser Al-Rahawi, nine ministers and two cabinet officials. -AFP

Jordan thwarts infiltration attempt at border

AMMAN: Jordan thwarted an infiltration attempt by four individuals across the northern border within its area of responsibility, after they attempted to cross the border illegally.

Jordan news agency (Petra) reported yesterday that Jordanian border guards deployed a rapid reaction patrol, arrested the infiltrators, and transferred them to relevant authorities. Jordanian authorities periodically announce the arrest of infiltrators, particularly along the northern and eastern borders. -QNA

Jordan, Belgium discuss strengthening military ties

AMMAN: Jordan's Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Major General Yousef Ahmed Al Huneiti discussed yesterday with Chief of Defence of the Belgian Armed Forces General Frederik Vansina, who is visiting Amman, joint coordination and ways to strengthen bilateral relations to serve the interests of the armed forces in both countries. The two sides also discussed the latest developments on the regional and international arenas. -QNA

China urges US, Japan to withdraw Typhon missile system

BEIJING: China urged Tokyo and Washington yesterday to withdraw the US-developed Typhon missile system, after it was unveiled in Japan for the first time during joint military exercises. Japan and the United States began the "Resolute Dragon" military drills on Thursday, and they will last until September 25, Tokyo's defence ministry said on X.

Japan's Self-Defense Forces

confirmed to AFP that the missile system had been showcased for the first time in the country over the course of the exercises, though it said the weapon would not be fired.

Beijing's foreign ministry yesterday called on the United States and Japan to "promptly withdraw" the missile system.

"The United States and Japan, disregarding China's solemn concerns, have insisted on deploying the Typhon midrange missile system in Japan under the pretext of joint exercises," spokesman Lin Jian told reporters at a regular briefing.

"China expresses strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition to this," he added.

The United States' Typhon missile system is part of the army's long-range precision strike "modernisation portfolio", according to an April report on the US Naval Institute's website. The system "leverages existing Raytheon-produced SM-6 missiles and Raytheon-produced Tomahawk cruise missiles and modifies them for ground launch", it added. It is "a truck-based, trailer-loaded system that is able to be employed throughout rugged and austere positions", US Colonel Wade Germann told reporters Monday. -AFP

Omani Cabinet commends outcomes of Doha summit

MUSCAT: The Omani Cabinet praised the outcomes of the Emergency Arab-Islamic Summit hosted in Doha on Sep. 14 and 15 and the resolutions it produced.

The Cabinet, which convened yesterday under the chairmanship of H M Sultan of Oman Sultan Haitham bin Tariq, expressed its condemnation of the Israeli aggression against the State of Qatar, considering it a blatant violation of its national sovereignty and of all international laws and norms. The Cabinet also affirmed its full solidarity with Qatar and complete support for all measures it takes in this regard.

The Omani Cabinet reiterated Oman's firm stance on the Palestinian cause and the situation in the occupied territories, denouncing the ongoing aggression against the besieged Gaza Strip and firmly rejecting the continued deliberate targeting of innocent civilians, medical and relief teams, journalists, and the infrastructure in the Strip. The Cabinet also condemned the persistence of starvation crimes against the population in Gaza, the prevention of aid from reaching them, and attempts to forcibly displace them. -QNA

China, Philippines coast guards trade blame over incident

MANILA: The Philippines said one person was injured yesterday when a water cannon attack by a China Coast Guard vessel shattered a window on the bridge of a fisheries bureau ship near a disputed shoal in the South China Sea.

Two Chinese ships used water cannons while in pursuit of the BRP Datu Gumbay Piang as it delivered rations to Filipino fishermen near the Beijing-controlled Scarborough Shoal, a Philippine Coast Guard spokesman said in a statement.

"This aggressive action lasted for about 29 minutes, resulting in significant $damage, \overset{\smile}{including} \overset{-}{shattered}$ glass from the aft window of the bridge" and "damage to the captain's cabin partitions", said Commodore Jay Tarriela. The China Coast Guard yesterday evening released its own statement saying the Philippine ship had "deliberately rammed" a Chinese vessel. Chinese ships had "taken control measures" on multiple vessels that had "insisted on illegally invading China's territorial waters of Huangyan Dao", China's name for the Scarborough Shoal, they said. An accompanying video showed the Philippine vessel making contact with one of the Chinese ships after it was hit by the water cannon. - AFP

US kills three in strike on alleged drug boat from Venezuela: Trump

WASHINGTON: The US military on Monday conducted a new attack on alleged drug smugglers from Venezuela, killing three people, President Donald Trump said on social media.

"This morning, on my orders, US military forces conducted a SECOND kinetic strike against positively identified, extraordinarily violent drug trafficking cartels and narcoterrorists." Trump wrote in a post on Truth Social that included video of a small boat suddenly erupting in flames. "The strike occurred while these confirmed narcoterrorists from Venezuela were in international waters transporting illegal narcotics ... headed to the US.'

In remarks delivered later to reporters at the White House, the president suggested his administration was preparing to take military action against Latin American cartels that move illicit drugs over land, too, presumably via Mexico. Trump did not identify any specific groups, saying only, "We're going to be stopping them the same way we stopped the boats."

The Pentagon referred questions to a social media post from Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth, who said that the Trump administration would "stop

at nothing" to defend the US homeland and its people from drug traffickers. "We will track them, kill them, and dismantle their networks throughout our hemisphere - at the times and places of our choosing," he added.

Monday's strike follows another deadly operation on Sept 2, in which US forces targeted an alleged drug boat from Venezuela that carried 11 people in the Caribbean Sea. All on board were killed, Trump has said.

The action marked a dramatic escalation in how the United States counters drug trafficking that originates in Latin America, prompting lawmakers and legal analysts to question its legality.

Upon entering office in January, Trump signed an executive order designating drug cartels and other Latin American criminal groups as foreign terrorist organizations. Legal experts viewed this as an attempt to justify any future decision by the president to authorize military action, and the president's critics in Congress have said that the Trump administration itself acknowledged in past congressional testimony that such a designation alone does not permit the use of lethal force.

The White House

has disclosed little about how either operation came together, the legal authorities under which they were carried out, or how officials assembled information leading to the strikes - has insisted its actions are "fully consistent with the law of armed conflict."

In both cases, the use of lethal force appears to have occurred in international waters outside of an armed conflict. Traditionally, the US government has relied on the Coast Guard, which has law enforcement authorities, to intercept boats suspected of hauling illegal drugs and take their crews into custody.

While administration officials have discussed for months how to better counter drug trafficking, it has pivoted sharply on the issue in recent weeks. Last month, the Pentagon assembled an armada of at least eight warships and dispatched them to the region, describing the move as part of an "enhanced counternarcotics operation."

The Trump administration also has made moves to use Puerto Rico as a launchpad and logistics hub. Last week, Hegseth and Joint Chiefs Chairman Gen. Dan Caine made an unannounced visit to the island territory, and F-35 fighter jets were

spotted arriving there on Saturday.

Before Trump announced Monday's strike, Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro was still questioning the veracity of the video of the first attack. During a news conference in Caracas, Venezuela's capital, he called for the US to investigate the matter. The Maduro government has not commented on the latest strike.

"It is a diplomatic aggression and is on its way to becoming a military

aggression," Maduro said.

The boat targeted in the first military strike, on Sept 2 appeared to be turning around to head back to shore before the US launched its attack, according to two people familiar with the matter, who spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss a sensitive matter. The crew, these people said, realized their vessel had been detected by the US aircraft. Those details were reported earlier by the New York Times.

US decertifies Colombia as ally in drugs fight

BOGOTÁ: The United States said on Monday it has decertified Colombia as an ally in the fight against drugs, a decision that could cost Bogota hundreds of millions of dollars in US military support.

After decades of close alliance in the so-called war on drugs, US President Donald Trump denounced his Colombian counterpart Gustavo Petro for not only failing to curb cocaine production, but overseeing its surge to "all-time records", according to a signed determination the White House sent to Congress on Monday.

"Under President Petro's leadership, coca cultivation and cocaine production have reached record highs while Colombia's government failed to meet even its own vastly reduced coca eradication goals, undermining years of mutually beneficial cooperation between our two countries against narco-terrorists," Trump wrote. The Trump administration has repeatedly pressured Petro, the first leftist elected to lead Colombia, and voiced hope for a shift after elections next year.

Washington has conducted assessments annually since 1986 on the anti-narcotics efforts of some 20 drug-producing and distributing countries. -AFP

Italian court orders extradition of **Ukrainian in Nord Stream case**

ROME: An Italian court yesterday ordered a Ukrainian man arrested over the 2022 sabotage of the Nord Stream gas pipelines linking Russia with Europe to be extradited to Germany to face charges.

Serhii Kuznietsov, arrested in Italy last month on a German warrant, denies involvement and will appeal the ruling, his lawyer Nicola Canestrini told AFP. Kuznietsov, who says he was a member of the Ukrainian armed forces at the time, is accused of being part of a cell which placed explosives on the underwater pipelines in September 2022.

He faces up to 15 years in jail if found guilty in Germany, according to the ruling by the court in the northern Italian city of Bologna.

The pipelines that for years shipped Russian gas to Europe were damaged by huge blasts just months after Russia's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine.

Western powers who back Kiev were initially quick to blame Russia, which in turn accused them. German investigations have identified a Ukrainian cell of five men and one woman as the perpetrators of the blasts. -AFP

Denmark to invest over \$250m in Greenland

COPENHAGEN: Denmark has signed an agreement with Greenland for infrastructure development in the autonomous territory, coveted by the United States, Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said yesterday.

In the 2026 budget proposal to parliament, Denmark's government has allocated 1.6 billion kroner (\$253m) for 2026 to 2029. Under the new agreement, Denmark will fund the construction of a new runway in Ittoqqortoormiit, in eastern Greenland, and a new deepwater port in Qaqortoq, in the south, the Danish government said in a statement. Additionally, Denmark will, in the future, bear the costs of treatment for Greenlandic patients in Danish hospitals. - AFP

Serbia indicts ex-minister over train station tragedy

BELGRADE: Serbian prosecutors filed an updated indictment yesterday against 13 people, including a former minister, over a fatal railway station roof collapse that has triggered a wave of anti-government protests. The prosecution said all those indicted, among them former construction minister Goran Vesic, face charges of "serious crimes against public safety" over the tragedy that killed 16 people last November. -AFP

Trump files defamation case against NYT

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump filed a defamation lawsuit on Monday against the New York Times and several of its reporters, accusing the newspaper of libelling him in several articles in the lead-up to last year's presidential election.

Trump's attorneys listed examples of the reporters' coverage that touched on a range of subjects, including his wealth, business empire and rise to national prominence. "At the time such statements were made by Defendants, they knew or should have known that they were false and defamatory," the lawsuit read. — THE WASHINGTON POST

Belarus frees more dissidents under pressure

WARSAW: Belarus yesterday freed 25 people, including dissidents, in the second such release in under a week as US President Donald Trump pressures Minsk to release the more than 1,000 political prisoners rights groups say are behind bars.

"Alexander Lukashenko made a decision to pardon 25 people, including those convicted on extremism charges," his office said in a statement. -AFP

Tesla faces US auto safety investigation

WASHINGTON: US auto safety regulators opened an investigation into whether some Tesla Inc. vehicle doors are defective, citing incidents in which exterior handles stopped working and trapped children inside. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said yesterday it's opening a preliminary evaluation of Tesla's electrically powered door handles becoming inoperative due to issues with certain vehicles' low-voltage batteries. While the probe specifically focuses on an estimated 174,290 Model Y SUVs, the regulator said the investigation could widen. - *THE WASHINGTON POST*

2025 summer was Spain's warmest on record

MADRID: Spain this year sweltered through its hottest summer ever, the national meteorological agency AEMET said Tuesday, the latest in a string of global temperature records. The average temperature settled at 24.2C, smashing the previous record of 24.1C set in 2022, and the highest figure since records began in 1961, AEMET spokesman Ruben del Campo told a news conference. Nine of the 10 hottest summers in Spain since 1961 have occurred in the 21st century, he added. $-A\overline{FP}$

Luxembourg to recognise **Palestinian State**

BRUSSELS: Luxembourg has said it will join a raft of countries recognising the State of Palestine at a United Nations summit in New York next week.

President Emmanuel Macron is spearheading the drive on recognising a Palestinian state as international condemnation grows of Israel over its nearly two-year offensive in Gaza.

Speaking to journalists late Monday, Luxembourg's Prime Minister Luc Frieden said that "the situation on the ground has deteriorated considerably in recent months".

"A movement is now emerging in Europe and around the world to demonstrate that the two-state solution is still relevant," Frieden said.

"That is why the Luxembourg government intends to join those who recognise the State of Palestine at next week's conference on the two-state solution.'

Countries including Britain, Australia, Canada and Belgium have said they plan to recognise a Palestinian state at the meeting at the UN General Assembly.

Israel's war on Gaza has killed at least 64,905 people, also mostly civilians, according to figures from the territory's health ministry that the United Nations considers reliable. -AFP

Europe slow to match economic rivals US, China: Draghi

BRUSSELS: The European Union is "failing to match the speed of change" in the United States and China and must act urgently on economic reforms to avoid falling further behind, a key report's author said vesterday.

One year after former European Central Bank chief Mario Draghi delivered stark warnings — and hundreds of recommendations — in a milestone 400-page report for the bloc, he urged Europe to break its "complacency".

While Draghi welcomed the EU executive's push on competitiveness, which Brussels has made its top priority along with defence, he said citizens were "disappointed by how slowly the EU moves."

"They see us failing to match the speed of change elsewhere," said Draghi, a former Italian prime minister.

'Competitors in the US and China are far less constrained, even when acting within the law," he said during a conference in Brussels, warning not to blame "inertia" on the complexities of European policymaking.

"That is complacency," he said, warning Europe needed to deliver "results within months, not years"

One year on, the challenges Europe faces have only grown more acute, Draghi warned, with the global trade order shifting since the arrival of US President Donald Trump in January. Trade tensions, high public debt among EU countries and the exposure of Europe's

high dependencies on other countries have reminded the bloc, "painfully, that inaction threatens not only our competitiveness but our sovereignty itself," he said. The data, according to one Brussels-based think tank, demonstrates just how much more the EU needs to do to heed Draghi's call.

Of his 383 recommenda tions, only around 11 percent have been fully implemented while around 20 percent have been partially fulfilled, the **European Policy Innovation** Council found.

"Overall progress is mixed no game changers, but some substantial reforms," Deutsche Bank's Marion Muehlberger and Ursula Walther wrote in a note this month.

The EU has, however, advanced on defence.



Pointing to the threat posed

chief Ursula von der Leyen also said the 27-country bloc had to act faster while defending her record thus far.

She pointed to steps taken by Brussels on artificial intelligence, higher defence spending and cutting red tape to make life easier for companies.

'We will relentlessly stay the course until we get all of it done," she said. Europe has notably established a common platform to secure supplies of critical raw materials and poured billions into developing AI initiatives. -AFP

French prosecutors probe culture minister over luxury jewellery

PARIS: French prosecutors said yesterday they had launched a probe following reports that Rachida Dati, the outgoing culture minister who is aiming to become the mayor of Paris next year, failed to declare luxury jewellery.

Dati has served as culture minister since January 2024.

In April, French daily Liberation reported that Dati had not declared jewellery and watches worth €420,000 upon taking ministerial office.

In a comment to AFP, the public prosecutor's office said an investigation had been launched "following reports alleging the possible offence failure to declare

jewellery." Dati, 59, is a high-profile political figure and mayor of the French capital's chic 7th district who holds ambitions to become the mayor of Paris next year. -AFP

Personal data of 1.5 million people leaked in Swedish data breach

STOCKHOLM: Sweden's prosecution authority said yesterday the personal data of 1.5 million people had been leaked online after a cyberattack against an IT systems provider.

Swedish media said town and city councils and private companies had been affected.

The number of people targeted represents nearly 15 percent of Sweden's population of 10.6 million. The attack against systems provider Miljodata occurred during the weekend of August 23-24, the prosecution authority said in a statement. "The data stolen in connection with the attack on the system supplier has now been leaked.

'This concerns data belonging to more than 1.5 million private individuals," prosecutor Sandra Helgadottir said, adding that an investigation into the data breach was ongoing. Helgadottir said a group going by the name of Datacarry had claimed responsibility and the investigation focused on identifying the individual or individuals responsible.

"There is currently no evidence to suggest the involvement of a foreign power," she said.

Swedish media had reported that the hackers had demanded 1.5 bitcoin (roughly \$170,000) when they threatened to release the data.

Miljodata said over the weekend that the data had been published on the darknet.

The company said the type of data leaked included names,

addresses and contact details. The Swedish Authority for Privacy Protection said in late August it had received 250 reports from affected parties. According to the authority,

at least 164 municipalities and four regional authorities had been affected by the attack. Public broadcaster SVT

reported that employees, especially in the city of Gothenburg, had been affected by the hack.

A number of private companies had also seen their data compromised, including truckmaker Volvo, airline SAS and plane engine maker GKN Aerospace. -AFP

GU-Q scholar, boundary-breaking filmmaker representing Sudanese women on screen

DOHA: Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q) scholar and filmmaker Dr. Suzi Mirgani reached a cultural milestone last weekend when her debut feature film Cotton Queen was screened during International Critics' Week of the Venice Film Festival.

The film follows teenage Nafisa, who comes of age in a Sudanese cotton-farming village under the watchful eye of her grandmother, as modern ambitions clash with deeprooted traditions.

Dr. Mirgani, who creates under the moniker Suzannah Mirghani, is one of only a few Sudanese women to write and direct a feature-length drama about Sudan, and the first to do so for Cinema. "There are only around ten feature length dramas ever shown in theatres by Sudanese filmmakers, none by women," she noted.

With the war in Sudan ongoing since April 2023, the film is also a production triumph. "I waited for over a

could film in Sudan. I wanted to spend the considerable film budget in my country, but eventually chose to film in Egypt, where my Sudanese actors had taken refuge."

year for the war to finish so I Russian parents, Dr. Mirgani spent her formative years in Sudan before moving with her family to Doha at 16, where she went on to build her career as both a filmmaker and academic. Due to the intersection of her subject matter and life in the Gulf region, the film secured support from every major film grant-maker in the Middle East—including the Doha Film Institute (DFI), Red Sea Film Fund, and the Arab Fund for Art and Culture.

"I am indebted to my mentor at DFI, Annemarie Jacir, who encouraged me to bring this story to light and became my creative producer, and the support from GU-Q, which allowed me not to have to choose between my academic and creative work," said Mirgani.

Her filmmaking emerged from her academic research as Assistant Director for Publications at GU-Q's Center for International and Regional Studies. "The idea for the film emerged from a research project on Food Security in the Middle East," she explains, adding: "I became interested in the connections between Africa and the Gulf region, home to a large Sudanese diaspora, and how remittances and exchange have mutually contributed to development." She developed a film short "Al Sit," which now streams on Netflix, and is the author and editor of a number of books examining the intersection of politics and popular

Dr. Mirgani's cinematic voice, rooted in rich imagery and deep cultural insight, arrives at a critical moment for Sudanese storytelling. Alongside her film work, she is at the helm of GU-Q's upcomingHiwaraat conference, "Seeing Sudan: Politics through Art." The three-day event, which kicks off on September 18, will gather leading artists, academics, authors, journalists, and activists to confront Sudan's devastating war that has displaced nearly nine million people, and caused widespread famine and death.

With Cotton Queen sharing Sudanese stories on the global stage and Seeing Sudan convening critical dialogue in Doha, Dr. Mirgani continues to bridge worlds-illuminating her homeland's struggles and strengths through both art and scholarship.

Japan political party to install Al leader

TOKYO: An upstart Japanese political party said yesterday it will install an artificial intelligence as leader after its maverick founder quit following a disastrous showing in recent elections.

The Path to Rebirth party, which was launched in January by Shinji Ishimaru, a former mayor of a small city in western Japan, does not have a policy platform and its members are free to set their own agendas.

Ishimaru unexpectedly came second in the 2024 Tokyo gubernatorial election thanks to a successful online campaign but he quit the party after it failed to pick up any seats in this year's upper

house elections. "The new leader will be " Koki Okumura, a doctoral student of AI research who described himself as an assistant to the new leader, told a news conference.

Details about the AI are vet to be decided, including when and how it will be implemented, said the 25-year-old student at Kyoto University, who will nominally be the party's leader.

The AI will not dictate political activities of party members but will focus on decisions such as distribution of its resources among members, for example, said Okumura, who recently won a party contest to succeed Ishimaru. While attracting media attention, the party has struggled to win seats. -AFP

Cinema legend Robert Redford dies at 89 "Robert Redford's

legend Robert Redford, a screen great both in front of and behind the camera whose career spanned six decades, died early yesterday morning at his home in Utah, his publicist said. He was 89. Redford died in his

sleep, and a specific cause was not given, according to a statement by Cindi Berger, the

chief executive of publicity firm Rogers & Cowan PMK.

'Robert Redford passed away on September 16, 2025, at his home at Sundance in the mountains of Utah -- the place he loved, surrounded by those he loved," Berger said.

The tousled-haired and freckled heartthrob made his breakthrough alongside Paul Newman as the affable outlaw in the Western "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" in

After 20 years as an actor, he moved behind the camera, becoming an Oscar-winning director and co-founding the flagship Sundance festival for aspiring independent filmmakers.



A committed environmental activist, Redford also fought to preserve the natural landscape and resources of Utah, where he lived.

Born Charles Robert Redford Jr. on August 18, 1936, in Santa Monica, California, he was the son of an accountant.

Redford had four children with his first wife, Lola Van Wagenen, one of whom died as an infant.

He married German artist and longtime girlfriend Sibylle Szaggars in 2009.

A household name in English-language cinema around the world, Redford won a directing Oscar for his 1980 film "Ordinary People," as well as an honorary award in 2002. work as an actor, director and producer always represents the man himself: the intellectual, the artist, the cowboy," Barbra Streisand said in 2002 when presenting him with the Lifetime Achievement honorary Oscar.

Tributes began to pour in yesterday for the screen great.

"One of the lions has passed. Rest in peace my lovely friend," said Meryl Streep, in a brief emailed statement.

Germans turn to health apps as insurers foot the bill

SCHLEIDEN: German doctors are increasingly prescribing smartphone health apps alongside pills and therapy to patients, marking a growing trend towards digital healthcare.

Civil servant Mona Noe, 30, has long kept close watch over her diet in order to reduce cramps and bloating caused by irritable bowel syndrome.

Noe managed to persuade her doctor to prescribe her the app Cara Care, where she receives wellness tips and keeps a food diary to identify her pain triggers.

"It is difficult to do it by yourself," she said, preparing a vegetable stir fry without peppers or tomatoes at her home in Schleiden in western Germany, as per the app's instructions.

"The app has transformed my cooking by helping me avoid certain foods." Applications that help patients quit smoking, fight obesity or improve their mental health often cost hundreds of euros a month, but insurance companies are helping by footing the bill.

The programme Noe uses

is one of 56 now covered by German health insurers, signalling the country's turn towards digital health over traditional pen and paper options.

The digital health tools. known as "DiGA" in Germany, have been available on prescription since 2020, typically on three-month renewable subscriptions.

In the five years since the programme began, more than one million prescriptions have been written, according to a study by digital healthcare sector association SVDGV.

Johannes Patze, a doctor in Frankfurt, said he prescribes them "almost daily" -- particularly for mental health support while patients are on a waiting list for a therapy appointment. The apps provide patients with personalised mood tracking, online consultations with professionals, meditation sessions and motivational notifications.

The benefit is that "they're available around the clock, 24/7". But they come with a cost. A three-month health app subscription costs €600 (\$705) on average. -AFP
